IRRIGATE LAND NEAR WALLOWA

BANKS IN WALLOWA COUNTY ARE SUED BY ATTORNEY.

Mac Hake Still Preaches Merit of Sunflower Seed for Silage.

(From Wallowa Sun.)

The Three Lakes Ditch Company is being organized to irrigate 6000 acres of land in the Three Lakes and O. K. Gulch country about thirteen miles from Enterprise. Water rights have been secured for water from the Big Sheep Creek and water will pass through ditches and wooden pipes to the land to be irrigated. The cost of the project is estimated at \$100,000 but may cost more. Surveyor Haskell will commence work on the project as soon as he finishes work on a small irrigation project near Lostine.

District Attorney Fairchild has filed suit against Chas. Blyen, Ex-county judge, County Commissioner Ernest Johnson and Ex-county commissioner W. P. Newman for \$2484 which is alleged to be wrongly paid to the six banks of the valley as a refund of 25 per cent of their taxes for 1915. It seems that the banks put in their bills to the county court totaling \$2484 and the bills were allowed. This the district attorney claims was not according to law and he asks for a return of the money to the county.

Plans for the Roosevelt Memorial week have been partially completed. Daniel Boyd is county chairman, local chairman are as follows: C. T. Daniel, Wallowa; S. L. Macmill, Lostine; Jay H. Dobbin, Enterprise; F. H. Gault, Joseph, Oregon; H. B. Jory, Flora, Oregon. All schools in the county will be organized at the coming institute, the object being to have exercises in each school in the county on Roosevelt's birthday, October 27th. J. A. Burleigh is the county chairman to see that all churches in the county fittingly observe Sunday, October 19th as the beginning of the campaign to raise Wallowa county quota and working for the greatest American work Wallowa county ever observed.

There are too many farmers in Oregon possessed with the idea of a land speculation. The writer has found a farmer after farmer land poor who did not realize it. The farmer thought he was a farmer and yet allowed more than half his energies to be absorbed in carrying too much idle, half idle and worthless land on speculation. Many a farmer would be better off in 10 years if he would concentrate his capital on one-half or a quarter of his land and give the rest away to somebody who would use it. Entire neighborhoods are kept back with social life of the family dwarfed because of the disposition of several farmers in the neighborhood to hold out of use at a continual loss all the way from two to ten times more land than their capital and labor should cover.

BH Hanley, the sheep king of Harney county, has changed his policy of grabbing up all the land in the county, and will subdivide his vast tracts and sell a man just enough to make a good living on. This will mean greater production, more people and greater prosperity for all.

Mac Hake, county agriculturist, reports that twenty farmers in Wallowa county, have raised sunflowers for ensilage this season. Ten acres in the lower part of the valley are being filled with sunflowers ensilage. It is claimed after a thorough investigation by O. A. C. authorities that sunflowers have a greater food value than corn and a great amount is produced to the acre. Sunflowers have been yielding 15 tons of ensilage to ten of corn per acre.

Mr. Hake is very enthusiastic over the possibilities of sunflowers as a stock food and says that he expects to see 200 silos in the county in another year. There are twenty-five in operation now and last year there were only five. To demonstrate the sunflower ensilage it is planned to have stock men visit the farmers who have put the sunflower ensilage in their silos and acquaint the farmers with the value of this stock food. If we had 200 silos filled with sunflower ensilage this year, the 100 tons of stock shipped out to other places would have been fed at home.
