WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—The possibility of a compromise between the senate advocates and opponents of reservations to the peace treaty, is reported to be receiving serious consideration by Democratic leaders conferring today after Senator Lodge called a foreign relations committee meeting for tomorrow. Senator McCumber, of North Dakota, Republican, introduced what are termed "compromise reservations."

Steward at 1815 Spruce street last night and organized what is known as the La Grande Colored Civic club and in the future will have regular meetings for the purpose of raising the standard of citizenship and doing what seems to be best for the colored race. The officers of the newly made club are Mrs. J. E. Smith, president; Mrs. J. L. Steward, vice-president; J. L. Steward, secretary and auditor; J. S. Smith, chaplain; J. B. West, social officer. Brief talks were made by those present including L. Thomas, a well known colored worker of Seattle.

The organization was made by Miss Lucretia Harris Gray, of Spokane, who is organizer for colored people along with her work as missionary for four states in the West. She is also here representing the Colored Folks' Home, which is a place for old colored people who have passed the age of being able to work.

## MORE ALASKA GOLD.

FAIRBANKS, Alaska, Sept. 12.—(By Mail)—Gold-bearing ground in the Fairbanks district suitable for dredging purposes shows a total of 218,900,000 cubic yards with gold content estimated at \$100,200,000. This is the gist of a report made by a committee composed of mining engineers and practical mine operators to the Alaska chapter of the American Mining Congress.

## LEAGUE STARTS STORES.

FARGO, N. D., Oct. 21.—Thirty-one stores operating in North Dakota at present, with expectations that before January 1, 1920 this number will be increased to 38, is the record of the Consumers' United Stores company, a

Non-Partisan League business venture. The company's assets are estimated at more than \$1,000,000.

The company operates on a cash basis and each contract holder pays \$100 for the privilege of buying merchandise from the stores at a price "not exceeding 10 per cent of the wholesale market price, plus transportation charges." The company has nearly 11,000 contract holders and the greater part of its capital—\$200,000—in cash and the balance in notes—comes from this source.

## RICE BRINGS SIX CENTS.

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Oct. 21.—The first shipment of Sacramento valley rice, 11,000 sacks, brought 6 cents a pound, one cent above the figures predicted earlier in the season. This year's yield in the valley, it is estimated, will be 4,400,000 sacks, exceeding that of last year by 1,000,000 sacks.
