FALL SALE OF SHORT HORNS

WILL BE HELD IN LA GRANDE SATURDAY, OCTOBER 25.

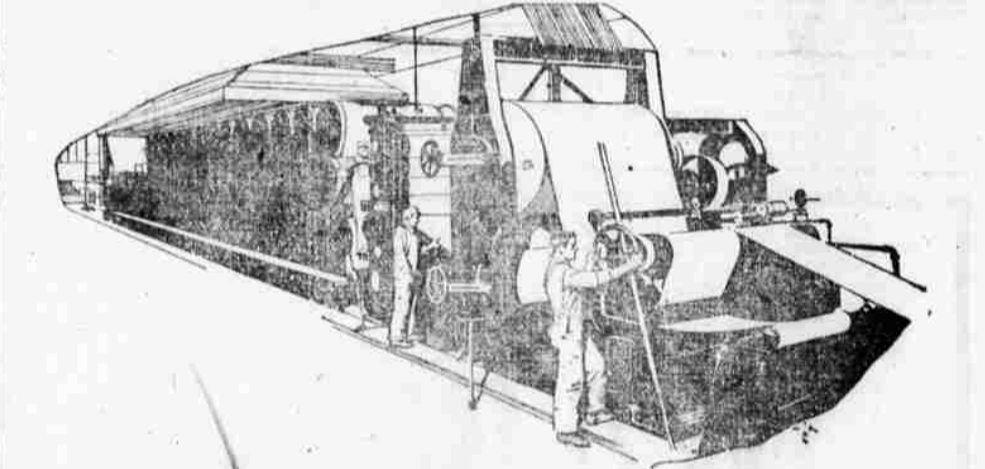
