LA GRANDE SO FAR HAS RAISED NINETEEN DOLLARS.

Today was the fourth day since the opening of the Roosevelt Memorial Fund in Union county, for the raising of \$480. Just what amount

have been handed in at the other towns of the county is not known but from Perry comes the gratifying news that Perry, that little town who voted 68-0 in favor of good roads, who donated all of her war time quotas, is coming along fine in this fund and that many small donations have been turned in to the chairman, Horace J. Nelson.

La Grande, with its larger population, has a fund so far which looks mighty slim. Late this afternoon the La Grande National bank had a total of \$14.50, the United States National Bank, \$4.00; and Silverthorn's Drug store, which was added late yesterday afternoon, to the list of places where money might be turned in, had 50 cent turned in this morning.
