congress, the funding will become more severe and serious.

Supply Uncertain. "Conditions are so abundant and the prospect of securing a regular supply of sugar at a reasonable price for the people of the United States for the year 1920 is so uncertain that the equalization board concludes from a commercial point of view that its duty requires it to suggest to the president, in reply to the communication from the representatives of Cuban producers, negotiations be entered into for the purpose of securing the sugar required for the necessities of the people of the United States for the year 1920 from Cuba under some what the same arrangements as the equalization board was able to make with the Cuban exporters and producers and the refinery of

the United States for the year ending December 31, 1919." Mr. Zabriskie testified he wrote the president for the board on August 11. A polite note from the private secretary of the president acknowledging receipt of the communication was the reply received by the board and after waiting until September 29, Mr. Zabriskie testified, he again wrote the president as follows: "My Dear Mr. President: Referring now to my letter to you of the 11th day of August, enclosing the report from the board of directors of the United States sugar equalization board, and also referring to your letter to the representatives of the Cuban government in reference to the Cuban crop of raw sugar for the year 1919-20, I desire to respectfully bring to your attention, the fact that the time is fast approaching, if it has not arrived, when we will be unable to control the Cuban crop of sugar for the year 1919-20 unless action is taken at once.

Early Policy Aided. "I am informed that considerable tonnage of Cuban sugar of the crop of 1919-20 has already been sold, and it seems entirely probable that the representatives of the Cuban sugar will withdraw their proposition unless some action is taken at once.

"May I, therefore, respectfully ask an early determination of the policy which the United States equaliza-

tion board is to adopt. I refer to the matter referred to in my letter of the 11th day of August. I have the pleasure to say that the board is now in possession of the necessary information to enable it to make a report to your honor.

Several days ago, Mr. Zabriskie received another note from the president's private secretary acknowledging the board's letter and stating that it would be brought to the attention of the president at the first favorable opportunity.

Offer Withdrawn. "Although the Cuban representatives conclude that the government did not desire to purchase the crop, under the board's withdrawal of the offer and expressing regret that it had not been accepted.

"In the interval that has transpired we have studied your answer, confidently believing that the United States government would undertake the continued control of sugar, and every interest concerned, especially the American consumer would experience the advantage of a stabilized market," reads the letter of Cuba's representatives withdrawing the offer.
