BIG BONFIRE WILL BLAZE

HOME-COMING AT U. OF O. BEGINS NOVEMBER 14.

Governor O'Connell to Speak at Rally—Prizes to Be Given for the Most Original Stunts.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Oct. 28.—Stunts and speeches around the "biggest bonfire that ever blazed" at this university will open the festivities of Home-coming, Friday evening, November 14.—From then on until the "Home Sweet Home" at the big dance in the armory, Eugene's largest hall, the week will be full of action and enjoyment for Oregon's guests. Special trains are being arranged for, to bring in the visitors. Governor O'Connell has been invited to come down from Salem, and say a few words to the assembled students and alumni Friday night. Addresses will be made by President Campbell, Professor H. C. Howe, head of the faculty committee on Athletics; Charles "Shy" Huntington, coach; Bill Hayward, trainer; Charles Robinson, of Astoria, and Walter Winslow, of Salem. Robinson and Winslow are prominent alumni. Prizes are to be offered for the most original stunts. It will be just an old-time Oregon rally.

Saturday afternoon will be devoted to showing the visitors the campus with its many changes since the early days. At noon the multitude will be fed at a campus lunch. In the afternoon the big football game of the year, the one with Oregon Agricultural College, will be played on the new athletic field with its seats for 6000.

Committees in charge are already at work on the arrangements for a big informal dance. A ten-piece orchestra has been engaged and no detail will be omitted which would help to send the visitors home with the feeling that the great growth of recent years has detracted nothing from the old Oregon spirit of the earlier days.

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TRAINMEN VOTE TO STRIKE

THURSDAY IS DATE SET FOR BIG WALKOUT.

H. R. T. Lodge's Take Secret Ballot of More Than 600 Men Affected. By Result of Vote.

CHICAGO, Oct. 31.—Fourteen lodges of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, representing 12,000 men in the Chicago jurisdiction District, voted at a secret meeting Sunday to strike Thursday unless their wage demands are met in full. A vote on the proposition is in progress in the other lodges of the 180,000 trainmen throughout the country.

A committee of the brotherhood's grand lodge, headed by President W. G. Lee, will confer with Director General Hines in Washington Wednesday.

Included in the strikers' list are the Chicago and North Western, Great Northern, Illinois Central, Rock Island, St. Louis and Missouri Pacific, and the Union Pacific.

The history of the demands which were formulated at the annual convention in Columbus, O., in May, was included in the strike message sent to individual lodges. The demands were filed with the board of railroad wages and working conditions July 2.

Ask \$150 Minimum Proposed wages and rates were discussed with board from July 23 to July 31. The rail men held out for not less than \$150 a month.

At the meeting Sunday, headquarters with Mr. Hines and the wage board was expressed. The railroad shippers' wait of 10 months without results was cited.

The strike declaration that the present action is taken with "no tinge of un-Americanism, no tinge of Bolshevism, no tinge of Red, but the highly aggravated feeling of our members' pain and cannot be ignored," states:

"We have unflinchingly supported the cause of our government in its fight for democracy by contributing thousands of men to its fighting forces and unflinching dollars to its many funds; we are determined more than ever to respect Old Glory, her cause and her great honor; but we also are in our national opinion that we shall not be deprived of any right or wage that Old Glory and our armed forces, together with all other American institutions, should guarantee all honest workers."

Denounce Cuminis Bill Another resolution adopted denounced the Cuminis bill as "making wage slaves out of 2,000,000 free born American citizens" by providing fine and imprisonment for railroad employees who strike. The national officers are requested to oppose its enactment.

Resolves Mr. Lee, the committee which is to meet Mr. Hines in conference of five general managers from each system, and another waiting conference, in connection with the strike.
