NO POLITICS FOR LEGION HERE SATURDAY

HOTTEST FIGHT OF THE SEASON ON FLOOR YESTERDAY

Indianapolis Will Be Permanent Headquarters of 10th Legion—Next Convocation at Cleveland

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 12.—The hottest fight of the West American Legion in session here was precipitated here yesterday by the raising of the question whether the legion shall be kept out of politics. The convention, voted to amend its constitution to make the organization "non-political" and bar candidates for public office from holding office in the legion.

Deportation of Victor Berger, recently elected a seat in congress, and opposing of Representative Voight of Wisconsin, who cast the only vote in Berger's favor, was recommended to the American Legion convention yesterday and was received with tremendous cheering. On motion of the entire Wisconsin delegation the resolution demanding expunction of Berger's citizenship was unanimously adopted.

Indianapolis was chosen for permanent national headquarters of the American Legion, defeating Washington, D. C., on the second ballot. Cleveland was chosen for the next convention of the American Legion over San Francisco.

EQUAL SHARES SAYS BALFOUR

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Arthur J. Balfour, foreign minister, in opening the league of nations campaign, declared the future of the league would be dark indeed unless all the powers, particularly the great powers, were prepared to take equal share in the burdens the league rest upon them.

AMERICAN LOSSES NUMBER 293,089

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—In the midst of the celebration of the anniversary of the signing of the armistice, the tragedy of the war again was emphasized by announcement of a revised list of American casualties, showing a total of 293,089. The list includes 94,625 killed in action, including 282 lost at sea; 226,464 wounded in action, 216,450; missing in action, 2.

FEW MINERS HAVE RETURNED TO WORK

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Nov. 12.—Few miners reported for work at the coal mines today. Operators expected a lull in several days before the production again became normal.

OHIO MINERS WILL NOT RESUME WORK

LOANS, Ohio, Nov. 12.—We accept the order as an organization, but as individuals, miners in no district desire they would resume work.

This statement was made here today by Conrad Weir, secretary-treasurer of the United Mine Workers of America, headquarters No. 1, district No. 8. This district comprises the entire Hocking valley coal fields.

There are 16,000 miners idle in this district. No. 1 union leaders declared.

Weir said miners in this district are a unit against returning to the mines.

PENDLETON GAME HERE SATURDAY

LITTLE KNOWN OF NEIGHBORHOOD FOOTBALL TEAM.

La Grande High Has Chance For Eastern Oregon Championship.

The La Grande high school football team is within striking distance of the Eastern Oregon Championship, and the game to be played with Pendleton here next Saturday will no doubt decide this. Elgin, who has been a strong contender for the honors, went down to defeat before the fast Baker team yesterday by a score of 19 to 7, and as La Grande has defeated all the rest of the teams of any caliber, Pendleton alone remains between them and the championship.

Two years ago the same thing happened. La Grande had defeated Baker by a large score and should have easily won over Pendleton, but over confidence and miscalculation of the strength of the latter team were the cause of a 12-to-13 score. The local crowd is not likely to be caught in such a predicament in this coming game, and although they are feeling somewhat elated after their win over Baker, nevertheless they realize that Pendleton will have a hard team to defeat. No line up at all has been obtained on the visitors only that they have a large squad out to practice and are expected to beat La Grande.

Saturday's contest will start at 2:30 and will be played on the high school grounds.

Pasadena Visitor Declares Good Sense Will End Labor Strife

PARADISE, Cal., Nov. 12.—Chas. M. Schwab, accompanied by Mrs. Schwab and a secretary, arrived at a local hotel for what he said would be his first "real vacation" in 20 years.

Mr. Schwab said he did not care to discuss industrial questions, saying there has been "too much talk already." He added, however, that he had an abiding faith in the good sense of labor and capital, and believed that they were settling closer together. The radical elements, he said, would have to give way on both sides to the common sense of the big majorities.
