BOLSHRIVISM EFFECTS TOLD BY PROFESSOR

(By Associated Press to The Observer)
OSHEE, —Vladimir Oct. 5
—The story is the story of Russia
and it is on this soil that Bolshevism
flourishes, says Professor A. A.
Oshinsky, the Polish chief of
the Intelligence Department of the
All-Russian government.

He defines the Bolshevism as
not "There is no more law, no curth,
burn, pillage, kill and you will be
rich and happy." The Bolshevism
and credulous believe this and after two
years the world sees the ruin of
Russia.

According to the professor, they
have no axes, axes, shovels, or
mills in Russia. The Council of
National Commissaries is order-
ing that all the valuable Russian
textile machines in Russia be con-
verted into such utensils as there is
no cotton in Russia and all
textile works are idle.

Of the chemical industry there
is not a trace. All manufactured
goods have been exhausted. Ma-
chines are idle.

The professor estimates that all
debt of Russia could be paid up by
exporting its vast supply of timber
and that its great stores of coal
and soft coal would suffice the
world for 100 years. Russia's sur-
plus of iron, copper, zinc, molyb-
denum and the wealth in fish of the
Pacific and Northern oceans, and
Bering rivers, and its industries
could be utilized as a firm founda-
tion for any economical and finan-
cial policy that might be adopted
by any Russian government.

"But to accomplish this it is
necessary to have normal living
conditions, continuity of work and
assistance of the interests of man
and property," says Professor
Oshinsky. "The Bolshevism of
these conditions, he believes the All-
Russian government at Oshinsky is
making progress."

"Having lived from Bolshevism
one-third of Asia," he says, "the
Oshinsky government has, however,
untouched the whole of the gold
mines belonging to the former
Russian empire, preserved it for the
whole of the Russian people. Im-
mense sums have been assigned for
the purchase of agricultural ma-
chines and fertilizers. The govern-
ment has sworn to convene a consti-
tuent assembly which shall decide
the long question of distribution
of land among the peasants."

"The Bolshevism having been
and actually given land to the peas-
ants, began to introduce the com-
munist principle into its economic
policy and its method of distribut-
ing supplies with the consequence
that all Soviet Russia has been
shaken by peasant uprisings."
