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AD CLUB GIVES WATER REPORT

BELIEVES IN WELLS FOR TEMPORARY USE.

Committee Appointed to Investigate Water System, Present Themselves at Last Night's Meeting.

La Grande, Oregon, November 12, 1919.—To the Honorable City Commission of the City of La Grande, Gentlemen: Herewith I respectfully submit on behalf of the Union County Ad Club, the report of a special committee appointed to confer with the city officials and to investigate the water situation in La Grande, and the possibilities for a temporary relief from the present shortage.

I heartily endorse the report of this committee and I am sure that from the many expressions of opinion I have heard from the members of the Ad Club and other citizens of La Grande, that this committee has the endorsement of the business interests of the city as well as other organizations which have expressed themselves publicly on the question.

In view of the fact that some immediate action is necessary to relieve a condition which endangers the health of the people of this city, as well as resulting in great inconveniences and damage to property, we respectfully urge that your honorable body take immediate steps to provide an auxiliary supply of water in the way recommended by this committee in their report.

Assuring you that it is the desire of this Ad Club to assist you in every possible way in the administration of the affairs of this city and that this report is not submitted in a spirit of criticism, but as an expression of the general sentiment of its members, I am, respectfully, H. E. COOLIDGE, Pres. Union County Ad Club, Ad Club's Report.

La Grande, Oregon, Nov. 12, 1919. To H. E. Coolidge, President Union County Ad Club: We, your committee appointed to investigate and report to you our recommendation of a good and sufficient supply of pure water for the city of La Grande, wish

to state that upon personal investigation and from our knowledge of the existing water system of La Grande, we are of the opinion that it is necessary to add to the present system by the use of a well to assist in giving a sufficient supply of water instead of that of pumping from the Grande Ronde river as has been the custom and practice for several years past. We feel that we have no right to use the water so pumped from the Grande Ronde river, as contamination exists and prior rights on said river interfere with our getting a sufficient supply at a time when it is most needed, and we know, by having investigated a well now owned by the O.W. R. & N. Co., that a supply of water could be obtained by the sinking of wells or by the city negotiating with the said R. R. Co. to bring its well into further use by getting consent to operate the same to test the supply that would naturally come from a well of this description. If one well should prove inadequate and yet seem to be the proper way to obtain a good and sufficient supply of water, another well could be constructed to still increase and bring a sufficient amount of water for the needs of this city. It is a well known fact to us that the water heretofore being stored at the reservoir known as Beaver creek, has been of such inferior quality during the summer months that we feel it is not to the interests of the city nor to the benefit of the health of our people that this supply be continued indefinitely. We have made no estimate of the cost of construction of the recommended well or wells, but feel that they can be constructed at a cost reasonable enough to justify the experiment as it would be to determine if a sufficient amount of water could be so supplied.

It is not our purpose to condemn the present Beaver creek pipe line nor to say that this system can not be brought into better use, but we do say that the water from this system for the past three years has been of a very inferior quality and the supply therefrom has been entirely inadequate for the use of our people during several months of the year, and to better the condition as it now exists, we recommend the use of wells as aforesaid as an auxiliary to the present system until such time as the commission may find a better and more pure supply in sufficient quantity to meet the requirements of our city. That we recommend action be taken at once upon this or some other system that will insure the needs as above stated.
