SEATTLE UNION RECORD
APPEARED AGAIN TODAY

Memorial Services for Former Service Men Held This Afternoon—Eleven I. W. W.'s Held on Charge of Murder, 66 on Criminal Syndicalism Charges.

CENTRALIA, Nov. 14.—C. A. Godfrey, a mill worker was shot in the shoulder, early today by a former service man, who was on guard duty here. Godfrey had disregarded the guard's command to halt, several times it is reported.

SEATTLE, Nov. 14.—Federal officers today again seized and closed the office and plant of the Seattle Union Record, a daily newspaper. Publication of the Record was stopped and United States Marshal John M. Bole said only court orders would release the press from today's seizure.

SEATTLE, Nov. 14.—The Union Record newspaper, which was seized yesterday by federal officials who arrested the editor, E. B. Ault, and two of the directors, appeared again today, by permission of the government. Three of the men arrested are held under the espionage act, and were released on bonds.

CENTRALIA, Nov. 14.—The public memorial services for the four former American soldiers killed Tuesday are to be held late today and will be attended by American Legion men from many northwest points, who have been arriving throughout the day. Charges of first degree murder will be filed against eleven of the alleged I. W. W. arrested according to the district attorney, notwithstanding the testimony of Dr. Frank Bickford, who said former soldiers attacked the I. W. W. hall before the shots were fired.

TACOMA, Nov. 14.—Charges of criminal syndicalism were preferred today against 66 alleged I. W. W. arrested Wednesday and Thursday the district attorney announced. The general charge is that the prisoners are members of an organization teaching crime and sabotage.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 14.—A report that I. W. W. were gathering at Bixby, Wash., in preparation for attacking the Thurston county jail at Olympia to release three men arrested at Centralia Tuesday, brought every available citizen who could secure a weapon to the jail Thursday night, a message to the Ledger from Olympia says.

Members of the sheriff's force and local police, aided by former soldiers, Thursday night boarded a Tacoma eastern train at Bismarck a suburb, and on arriving in Tacoma arrested 18 passengers alleged to be I. W. W. Still other suspects are believed to have left the train just before reaching Bismarck, and a posse went in search of them. The men arrested here came from Mineral, Wash.

The prisoners, it was stated, are Commodore Brand, suspected of being the slayer of Lieut. Warren G. Gillingham; Attorney Elmer S. Smith and John Doe Reynolds.

While the armed citizens were said, the three prisoners were rushed into an automobile and were started for the state reformatory at Monroe, Wash.

A posse was formed and set for Bixby to round up any radicals found there.

BOUVY HEADS MEDICAL MEN

LA GRANDE WILL BE CONVENTION PLACE NEXT YEAR.

Meeting at Pendleton Yesterday With the Election of Officers.

La Grande was selected for the next annual convention seat of the Eastern Oregon District of the Medical Board at their meeting Pendleton yesterday. It is planned to hold next year's convention about October 1.

Dr. K. M. Bouvy was elected president of the medical men for the ensuing year, Dr. Higgins, of Baker secretary, Dr. McNary of Pendleton first vice-president, and Dr. Templeton of Pendleton, second vice-president.

LEGION FAVORS OUSTING REDS

OREGON DELEGATION SPONSORS
ALIEN RESOLUTION.

Will Ask Congress to Pass Law to Prohibit Dangerous.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 14.—The convention yesterday adopted a resolution for deporting alien slackers. This upholds the resolution adopted by the Oregon State Legion convention and was piloted through the committee by Jesse Hinman of Astoria and adopted unanimously.

A resolution was passed demanding that political prisoners who evaded the draft and were found guilty of seditious crimes be held and after their sentences are completed, that the aliens be deported. A resolution to deport alien slackers who reneged their first citizenship papers during the war was also passed. Both resolutions were favored by the Oregon delegation and passed unanimously this morning.

The resolution, demanding that congress pass a law preventing anyone or a society in the United States from carrying on a verbal, written or printed intercourse or correspondence with anyone with the intent to overthrow the government, was unanimously adopted at the morning session of the American Legion convention.

MAY NAME NEW SHELL AFTER OLD TRAINER

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 14.—The University of Washington's new crew shell, now being built here, probably will be named "Hiram B. Cougle" after a veteran Washington crew coach who was killed several years ago. No definite decision will be made in the matter until the shell is completed.

NORTH POWDER CASE WILL BE APPEALED

BAKER, Nov. 13.—Judge Anderson yesterday sustained the return of Nichols & Haddock in the case of James B. Dalton, vs. the North Powder bank, a suit to enjoin the defendants from attaching property claimed by Mr. Dalton. The bank had secured a writ of attachment previously to insure the payment of a note alleged to be owing them from Wiley Dalton. Smith & Smith, attorneys for the defendant, said today that the ruling will be appealed to the supreme court.

GOVERNMENT AUTOS SELL AT HIGH PRICE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 14.—At the latest weekly sale of motor vehicles belonging to the War Department, 222 unserviceable vehicles brought an aggregate of \$122,000. Some of the buyers came from points as distant as Iowa. One truck sold for \$2200, which was the highest price paid for any vehicle. Tourist cars as well as trucks were included in the number sold.

GRID CONTEST FOR TOMORROW

PENDLETON TEAM WILL CLASH
WITH LOCALS.

Eastern Oregon High School Championship Will Be Decided, and a Fast Game Is Expected.

Only a short space of a few hours separates either the football team representing the Pendleton or La Grande high schools from the championship of Eastern Oregon, as these two teams remain undefeated in this race for honors, and they will meet in battle at 2:30 tomorrow on the local high school grounds. It was just two years ago that these same two teams played the final game for the championship, and only the over-confidence of the La Grande team kept them from winning the 13 to 13 contest that was played in the Round-Up city.

While only two members of the 1917 team are playing on the squad that will represent La Grande tomorrow, nevertheless every man feels as though Pendleton must be vanquished and that she shall not again stand between them and the championship. They are in tip-top shape physically, having had only light spring practice since the Baker game last Saturday, but what was true two years ago is true now—they are too sure of winning, and unless their frame of mind is changed between now and the blowing of the whistle tomorrow, Pendleton is again liable to be a serious contender. During the last five contests between these two schools, each team has won two games and one has been a tie. In 1913 Pendleton won on their home grounds by a 21 to 3 score; in 1914 La Grande won at home, by a score of 34 to 0, and again in 1915 managed to slip over a 3 to 0 victory, due to a field goal kicked by Jimmie Rosenbaum, who is captain of the local team this year. In 1916 Pendleton won over a team coached by Niles, by a score of 24 to 0, while in 1917 the tie game of 13 to 13 was played at Pendleton.

The team that wins the contest tomorrow also wins the odd game, and every student in the high school is using every influence with the powers that be, hoping that it will be a continuation of victories for La Grande.

Lloyd Pierce, formerly a member of the O. A. C. team, will act as one of the officials, while the others have not yet been selected. The Pendleton team will either arrive on Nov. 18 to-night or Nov. 6 tomorrow. No one from La Grande has seen the visitors in action this year, so that it has been impossible to obtain a lineup on their strength. Reports are that the same old Pendleton spirit that has carried many of their teams to victory, is on the rampage and is due to show itself in the game tomorrow.

The La Grande lineup will in all probability be as follows: Kivette, center; Thompson and Ruckman, guards; McClure and Bean, tackles; Theisen, Newlin and Hunter, ends; Captain Rosenbaum and Johnson, full-backs.

OPERATORS TURN DOWN CONFERENCE

NON-UNION MINES WILL NOT
ACCEPT INVITATION OF
SECRETARY WILSON.

FEAR PARTICIPATION
MAY BE MISCONSTRUED

Non-Union Operators, Outside the Competitive Field, Will Not Attend Conference Called By Secretary of Labor Wilson, to Bring Present Strike to An End.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Holding that their participation might be construed as an acceptance of the union principle, the operators of non-union mines outside the central competitive field today announced they would not accept the invitation of Secretary Wilson to participate in the conferences called by the secretary, in an effort to end the strike of the coal miners.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—"The demands of the miners for 50 percent wage increase and a 30-hour week are impossible and ought to be eliminated," Secretary Wilson declared at the opening of the coal industry conference here today.

SENATE PASSES RESERVATION

REPUBLICANS ASSISTED BY
FOUR DEMOCRATS WIN.

Closure Proposal for Future Action Follows Final Action Soon.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Squaring the issue with President Wilson, the senate adopted Thursday a reservation qualifying the obligations of the United States under article 19 of the league of nations covenant.

A solid Republican lineup, reinforced by four Democratic votes, put the reservation across exactly as it came from the foreign relations committee, and in virtually the language which the president declared on his western tour would cut the heart out of the covenant and mean the rejection of the treaty. The vote by which the reservation won was 46 to 23.

The fight for reservations having thus been carried to a climax, the Republicans presented for future action a closure proposal designed to bring final action on the question of ratification within a week. A sweeping measure, proposing limitation on the reservation debate, had been put on by the Democrats earlier in the day, but rejected when the Republicans voted to sustain a point of order against it.

A vote on the question of clamping down a closure on debate will come Saturday morning, and the Republican leaders say it will depend entirely on the Democrats whether the move rallies the necessary two-thirds to make closure effective. The Democratic leaders were not ready Thursday night to say how they would vote, being fearful that agreement to so sweeping a program might imperil their chances to secure action on a ratification resolution of their own.

FARMERS WILL MEET IN SPOKANE NOV. 24

SPOKANE, Nov. 14.—One of the first matters which will be taken up by the farmers of this state at the Spokane meeting, November 24 and 25, will be that of educating the public to the fact that farmers are not responsible for the high cost of living, says a circular issued from the state headquarters of the Washington State Federation of Farm organizations.

The farmers' organization, formed last summer at Yakima, will hold its two-day meeting in Spokane to lay plans to centralize the work of the various farm organizations in the state. Every state, district and county farmers' organization will be entitled to representation.

ESTHONIANS AND REDS TALK PEACE

BELGIAN REFUGEES HAVE GONE HOME

To care for Belgian refugees has cost England by private means and government an enormous sum of money.

LEGION ELECTS YEAR OFFICERS

OREGON MAN IS ELECTED ONE
OF VICE-PRESIDENTS.

First Annual Convention, Closed With the Election of Officers.

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 14.—The first meeting of the legion executive committee was held yesterday and named the "Star Spangled Banner" as the election's official song. Casser Bacon, of Massachusetts, was elected national treasurer and Leonel Boes of Seattle, formerly of Sunset division, was named national secretary.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Nov. 14.—Oregon scored 100 touchdowns and kicked goals at the closing hours of the legion convention. William B. Polley of Eugene was elected one of the five national vice commanders on the first ballot.

The constitution for the legion was adopted as read without change or debate. The chairman of the committee that framed it, and its rescuer, was a Portland lawyer, Cassius R. Peck.

IRISH FLAG EXCITES MEN

Flag Is Removed from Position Beside Stars and Stripes by the Driver.

DR. WHITE TO LECTURE HERE

BIBLE CONFERENCE ARRANGED
BY LOCAL MINISTERS.

Services Will Begin at the Presbyterian Church Tuesday Night, of Next Week.

The Ministerial Association of La Grande will have a new thing for La Grande people next week in a Bible Conference conducted by Dr. W. P. White, of Albany, Oregon, one of the greatest Bible teachers in the United States today. Dr. White is field secretary of the Moody Bible Institute and has been pastor at Albany for 18 years.

Beginning Tuesday night at the Presbyterian church the conference will last until Friday night. Classes and lectures will be held at the Y. M. C. A. every Friday morning at 10 o'clock and every afternoon at 3 o'clock. The evening lectures will be held in the Presbyterian church at 7:30 o'clock.

FATHER KELLEY FOR LEGION CHAPLAIN

MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 14.—Roosevelt only took the floor once during the entire convention. Wednesday night he nominated Father Francis A. Kelley, of New York, for national chaplain. When he took the floor, Kelley from everywhere asked him: "How's the baby, Teddy?" Kelley was elected on the second ballot.

Oregon voted first for a Colorado chaplain and second for a Kansas parson.

At a late hour a resolution was adopted demanding that congress enact laws which would prevent children, born of parents who cannot be naturalized, from becoming citizens.

Almost the closing words heard at this convention were: "We will attack the red flag wherever it is raised."

PENDLETON TEAM HERE TOMORROW

Bad luck will not keep the Pendleton high school football team from completing their schedule. This was the decision which was reached at a meeting held at the high school last night. The practice which followed the meeting was highly satisfactory and increased the odds of winning the La Grande game several hundred per cent, according to those who saw it. The boys journey to La Grande to meet the L. A. S. team Saturday and on the following week-end they will go to Baker. La Grande is said to have beaten Baker by a good score so the coming game will be a hard one.

RADICALS AGITATING COAL FIELD

FEDERAL AGENTS SENT TO RID
THE MINING DISTRICT
OF I. W. W.'S.

SITUATION REGARDED
NASTY BY OFFICIALS

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Nov. 14.—Three unauthorized strikes today prevented miners from returning to work in ten coal mines of this district. More than 600 miners are said to be in open rebellion against the leaders, closing six mines and preventing other miners from working.

First step toward a roundup of radicals in the coal fields here was taken today, when federal agents combed the districts in which I. W. W. and other agitators have been spreading propaganda. As a result of the agitation, officials say, many miners have failed to return to their work.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Activities of radicals threaten serious troubles in the bituminous coal mine fields of West Virginia, according to reports received Thursday by the department of justice.

The situation was described by department of justice officials as "particularly nasty." Meetings, directed and attended largely by Russians, have precipitated some violence in the ranks of the coal miners, reports said. Few details were contained in the department's message. Officials assumed that the leaders were representatives of the union of Russian workers against whom the department is conducting a vigorous campaign.

The reports indicated that work of the Russians was directed at intimidating miners who sought to return to work following the withdrawal of the coal strike order.

Government agents have been sent to the districts where the trouble was reported and the department has instructed its representatives in all the mine fields to watch closely for any similar trouble.

EDUCATION FUNDS FOR HAWAIIANS

HONOLULU, T. H., Nov. 12.—Establishment of a permanent revolving fund for the education of young Hawaiians lacking means to improve their condition is the aim of the Hawaiian Civic Club, announced at a recent meeting of the club.

It is planned that the first Hawaiian, to possess by this will be Kaohu. McKenzie, professor of a tenor voice which has been highly praised by John McCormick, before whom McKenzie recently sang.

According to the tentative proposal \$4,000 will be raised and turned over to McKenzie with the understanding that it be paid back later and used for the education of the Hawaiians.

A club committee was appointed to undertake the raising of the fund.

Vancouver Prepares For Large Number of Stock Show Visitors

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 14.—Vancouver is preparing to take care of a large number of visitors expected here to attend the Pacific International Livestock Exposition which will be held November 17-22 in a \$300,000 stock show pavilion just across the Columbia river from here. Managers of the show expect 5,000 visitors a day. Over 2,000 entries have been visited.

HANLEY-PAGE PLANE STARTS LONG FLIGHT

MINEOLA, Nov. 14.—A Handley-Page bombing plane left here on an attempted non-stop flight to Chicago, carrying eight passengers and 1500 pounds of freight.
