WOMEN WORKERS ASK FOR BETTER WAGES

(By Associated Press in The Observer.) LONDON, Nov. 14.—Domestic servants affiliated with the National Federation of Women Workers are agitating for a standardized wage scale and the union's support of a program for enforcing improved conditions of service.

The proposals provide a minimum wage for all resident servants of \$150 a year; set meal times, a half-hour for breakfast, one hour for dinner, and a half-hour for tea; better sleeping accommodations, two hours free each day and a half-day addition each week; a twelve-hour day, including time off, and fourteen days' vacation each year, with full board and wages. One London newspaper in publishing these demands printed above the item this caption, "Why Not Marry the Girl?"

WINE CASKS FOR EUROPEAN WINE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14.—Wine casks, 14,000 of which are believed to be in California, in all probability will be used by wineries of foreign countries, since the advent of prohibition has virtually destroyed their usefulness in the United States, it became known recently when several representatives of European and South American wineries entered into negotiations to purchase casks located in this section of the state.

The California Wine Association which formerly controlled the marketing of California wine, in many instances, its production, has been approached by French, Italian and Argentine wine makers who have sought to purchase the casks. H. Romero Day, of Buenos Aires, recently visited this city and bought 100 of the great casks and had them knocked down and transported to Buenos Aires. It is estimated that there are 14,000 casks in this state. Of this number about 400 are of oak and the balance are of redwood. Oak casks are a scarcity now and it is these more than the redwoods that are sought.

W. H. HARDY WAS KNOWN HERE

DEATH OF FAMOUS VETERAN IS GRIEVIOUS

First Visited Japan and the Orient With Fleet Under Commodore Perry, Again in 1917.

By William T. Perkins. Little children have lost a friend, but heaven has come nearer and death has appeared only as a messenger that brings glad tidings of higher things.

The great pilot, the prow of whose ship is the golden beam of the sunset upon many waters, as sails the billowy clouds that move in majesty through the firmament, has called from us forever William Howard Hardy.

I loved that kindly veteran of many voyages. To me, and to many another, he was father, brother, counsellor and truest friend. Merely to be with him was an inspiration to noble thoughts and high endeavor. Have you gazed upon his patriarchal features and wondered at his length of years, despite the stress of wind and wave, the din and smoke of battle and of far adventure? Let me tell briefly of but one incident in the life of him who has fallen asleep and you will cease to wonder, for you will know whence came his abundant strength of body, and mind and soul.

In 1917 the people of Japan, who had heard of him as the last of that self-reliant company which, more than three score years before, had come to their shores with the American fleet under the command of Commodore Perry, sent to him man affectionate invitation to revisit their country, and, eager to see that land again, he determined to go. It was the evening of his departure. Many of his comrades of the Grand Army of the Republic and of the United Spanish War Veterans, together with a group of friends, had assembled at the Grand Army of the Republic hall to do him honor and to bid him Godspeed. Many were the messages of love and affection.

When the time came to go, a procession formed and he, waving aside the proffered automobile, went on foot to the station. Other friends had gathered there, and tender moments were spent in lingering farewells. Finally I drew him from the crowd and went with him to his sleeping car. Soon he dozed and then, clad in his simple gown of white, he knelt in the quiet semi-darkness and communed long and in silence with his maker. Wondering, I felt a presence there; and I knew that, far above, a company of angels leaned from the parapets of heaven and bent listening ears to catch his message to his God.

The voyage was made. Clad in his bluejacket's uniform, he stood proudly before the emperor and empress, prince and prelate. Children ran up to strew flowers in his path, and multitudes paused to listen to his plea for peace between nations, not only, but for that greater peace which is now his own.

The people of Japan would fain have kept him, but though he loved them as well as all mankind, he loved best his own country, so he sailed for home. Loving hands stretched forth in farewell, and loving voices followed him over the waters long after the shores of fair Nippon had faded from view.

The honor was mine of being the first to greet him when he stepped from the train and, as I put my arm about him, all unconsciously I breathed a prayer of thankfulness for his safe return.

He had sailed his last voyage. For him no more the steered rigging and the icy deck; no more the sudden storm, the stinging spray; no more the call to arms, the fierce combat, the righteous victory. Thenceforth for him the golden memories of duty done, the acclaim and the veneration of his countrymen and of his friends beyond the sea.

Yet, after all, he did not rest, for duty held him until that day when there came to him the sound of the mighty sea, and a glorious voice echoed through all the house: "Where is my servant?" And William Howard Hardy, sager and unafraid, rose and put on his uniform of blue and, answering, "Here am I," put forth to meet his pilot face to face.

Today, that part of him which was mortal sleeps on the hillside. Winter rains will fall softly there; summer suns will shine with gentle ray, grass will grow and flowers will bloom; falling leaves will return to earth; and ever the west wind, sweeping in

free and strong from the great waters he loved so well, will sing a requiem through the immemorial hills that stand like sentinels awaiting the dawn.

Under the wide and starry sky, Dig the grave and let me lie. Glad did I live and gladly die, And I'll lie down with a will. This be the verse you grave for me: Here he lies where he loved to be; Home is the sailor, home from the sea, And the hunter home from the hill.
