

WAGE SCALE AGREEMENT ANNOUNCED

CONFERENCE ACCEPTS WILSON'S PROPOSAL FOR Negotiations.

NO RESERVATIONS ASKED BY WORKERS

Agreement Was Reached After An Acrimonious Wrangle Between Miners and Operators Representatives Announced by John L. Lewis.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Acceptance without reservation of Secretary Wilson's proposal for the negotiations of a nation-wide wage scale agreement was announced at the conference today by John L. Lewis, acting president of the United Mine Workers of America.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—An agreement was reached after an acrimonious wrangle between the miners and the operators representatives.

Coal miners and operators did not agree on the nation-wide scale proposal, but did decide on a plan to negotiate the competitive fields of Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

BOLSHEVIKI OCCUPY ALL RUSSIAN CAPITAL

HIGH COST MEETING OFF.

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 15.—An attempt in a letter to United States Attorney A. Mitchell Palmer that he had decided to postpone, probably indefinitely, a conference requested by Mr. Palmer between federal, state and other officials on the high-cost-of-living problem, Governor Samuel L. McKelvie said there was no way of telling "the amount of injury that has been done Nebraska's prosperity by the ill-considered action of those who would lead the country to believe that it is possible to effect an artificial regulation of the laws of economy."

"I have no doubt that the decline in the price of hogs and corn has cost Nebraska farmers at least \$50,000,000, and yet no benefit has accrued to the consumers because of this decline," the governor wrote.

HINDENBURG IS SHIELDED

Students Refuse to Allow Marshall to Testify About War.

BERLIN, Nov. 15.—Pan-German students today refused to permit Field Marshal von Hindenburg to enter the Reichstag building to testify before the sub-committee which is investigating war responsibilities. They forced the field marshal's chauffeur to return with the former commander-in-chief to his home.

JUST WAGE IS URGED TO QUIET RADICALS

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 15.—A call for industrial justice, which would prevent the interruption of services essential to the community, was advocated tonight by Charles H. Hughes in an address on "The Antidote for Bolshevism" at the city's Christian church.

Referring to public war compensation and basic industrial justice, he said: "If the community provided just means for the settlement of complaints and for the redress of wrongs which might be suffered by the engaged in these essential activities, we should have no right to expect concerted attempts to disrupt the support of the community by the community and enforce demands under threat of violence against suffering and war." For industrial activity, he urged collective bargaining with decisions binding in law.

CLOTURE IS PASSED BY SENATORS

FIRST TIME IN SENATE HISTORY THAT ACTION WAS SPEEDIED UP

MONROE RESERVATION ADOPTED 55 TO 33

Closure Action Increases Speed and the next Reservation up is Passed in One Minute Without Roll Call—Shanting Reservation is Adopted

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The closure to shut down debate on the peace treaty was adopted by the senate today.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The action involving the closure has the first time in the senate history resulted in the immediate speeding of the reservation program, the next one on the list being adopted in one minute without a roll call. The Monroe doctrine reservation was adopted, 55 to 33, nine Democrats voting for it. The Shanting reservation was also adopted, 53 to 41.

Action was substituted for discussion in the senate today, and as a result the ratification of the peace treaty is nearing its final stage. With only two committee proposals left, the parliamentary stage for a decision is set for early next week.

CENTRALIA JAIL BEING GUARDED

EX-SOLDIERS AND GUARDSMEN STILL ON PATROL.

Searching Parties Continue to Scour Surrounding Country For Alleged Reds.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) CENTRALIA, Wash., Nov. 15.—National guardsmen and ex-soldiers who had been patrolling the city since last Tuesday's shooting, today confined their activities to the city jail. Other parties are still searching the surrounding country for alleged radicals.

TACOMA, Nov. 15.—Federal warrants charging conspiracy to overthrow the government were issued today against 88 men in custody at Tacoma and Centralia. As an outcome of the Armistice day trouble at Centralia this action was taken.

GROWERS JOIN FRUIT UNION

ROSEBURG, Nov. 15.—The Umpqua Valley Fruit Union will cease to exist on January 1, having voted unanimously at a stockholders meeting, to sell their plant and equipment to the Oregon Growers' Co-Operative association, and the Oregon Growers' Packing corporation, which are two bodies handling the fruit of the Oregon Growers' Co-Operative association.

The association is a selling body, selling at cost, and the packing corporation, which is affiliated with the association, handles the plants and packs the products at cost.

The plant at Roseburg is one of the finest in Oregon, being strictly modern in every respect. The lot is ideally located, near the center of the city, along the Southern Pacific railroad. The building is of modern construction with two full floors equipped with gravity lifts and automatic sizing machinery. The building is capable, when further equipped, of handling a tremendous tonnage of fruit.

J. O. Holt, of the Eugene association, who will be the manager of the Oregon Growers' Packing corporation next year which will operate all the buildings and packing plants handled by the Oregon Growers' Co-Operative association, was present at the meeting and told in some detail the methods used at Eugene, in handling their business and in building up their enormous plant. C. F. Lewis, organization manager, was also present to answer questions asked by the various members.

With 199 acres already on the books and with the members of the Umpqua Valley Fruit Union showing great enthusiasm the indications are that within the next two weeks a large increase will be added to the acreage signed up in the Umpqua valley, on the books of the Oregon Growers' Co-Operative association.

LA GRANDE WINS FROM PENDLETON

VISITORS ARE DEFEATED BY 38 TO 0 SCORE ON A MUDDY FIELD

CHAMPIONSHIP OF EASTERN OREGON WON

Only One Team Remains To Be Played Before Championship is Clinched By Local High School Team—Much Open Playing Done.

La Grande practically clinched the championship of Eastern Oregon yesterday afternoon when they defeated the Pendleton aggregation to the tune of 38 to 0. Only one team now stands between the local boys now and that is Elgin, who will play here next Saturday. Baker defeated Elgin, so the dope is all in favor of La Grande.

The game was played on a slippery field with a slippery ball and at times it was almost impossible to distinguish the players on account of the mud. Despite this the game was fast and much open playing was done. The game by plays follows:

La Grande kicked off to Pendleton, who lost the ball on downs. La Grande fumbled, losing the ball. Pendleton punted. Using Garrity, Crippen and Johnson, La Grande makes yardage and continues plowing thru the Pendleton line, Johnson going over for the first touchdown in less than ten minutes from the opening whistle. Rosenbaum kicked the goal. La Grande kicks off to Pendleton who makes five yards return. Pendleton makes no gains through the loose line and punts to Crippen after a forward pass fails. Crippen returns twenty yards. Pendleton offside, penalized five yards. First quarter ends with ball in La Grande's possession on Pendleton's thirty yard line. Score La Grande 7, Pendleton 0.

La Grande fumbles but Johnson recovers, making ten-yard gain. Ball goes to Pendleton on downs. Pendleton tries two passes in succession but both fail. Pendleton punts to Garrity who fumbles. Crippen recovers the ball and runs seventy yards for touchdown. Rosenbaum kicks goal. Pendleton kicks off to La Grande, Garrity returned the ball twenty yards. Time was taken out for Thiesen. Rosenbaum makes yardage. Pendleton recovers fumble and are held for downs. Punt to Crippen who returns ten yards. Johnson through the line and Garrity around end makes yardage. Pass fails. Pendleton penalized for off side play. A pass, Garrity to Rosenbaum, makes thirty yards and touchdown. Goal is kicked. La Grande kicks to Pendleton, who makes five-yard return. 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INSURGENTS SEIZE COAST

ARMY OF 70,000 OPERATING IN REAR OF DENIKINE.

REPORTS D'ANNUNZIO ON NEW ADVENTURE

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) TRIESTE, Nov. 15.—Gabriele D'Annunzio, who left Fiume Thursday by torpedo boat on a new expedition, has landed at Zara, on the Dalmatian coast, according to news received here.

PARIS, Nov. 15.—The American vice-consul at Trieste informed the American peace delegation here that it is reported that D'Annunzio left Fiume and landed on the Dalmatian coast, where he is engaged in a new adventure.

OLD METHODIST CHURCH IS DESTROYED BY BLAZE

Damage to the Amount of \$500,000 Caused by Fire Today—Two Stores Are Burned.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) OREGON CITY, Nov. 15.—Fire early today destroyed the Methodist church, said to be the oldest Protestant church west of the Rocky mountains, and two department stores, causing a loss of \$500,000.

PRINCETON DEFEATS YALE, 13 TO 7 SCORE

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) NEWARK, N. J., Nov. 15.—Princeton, by strategy, and turning a Yale trick into a touchdown, won from Yale here today. This is the first victory for the Tigers over Yale since 1911. Sheena made a sensational run through a broken field of Yale players, breaking pass and using stiff-arm defence, for the winning touchdown. Between 50,000 and 60,000 people witnessed the game.

"FLU" APPEARS AMONG MEN WORKING IN MILLS

YOUNGSTOWN, O., Nov. 15.—Spanish influenza has broken out among workmen living in steel mills here on account of the steel strike, according to announcement by Youngstown hospital officials today, who said that six cases had been taken to the hospital from the Ohio works of the Carnegie Steel company, and three from Brier Hill Steel company.

Several hundred men have been living in each plant during the eight weeks of the strike.

PUBLISHERS FAVOR RISE NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 15.—A resolution favoring a 25 per cent increase in foreign and local advertising rates in southern newspapers because of the increased cost of new print paper was adopted today by the advertising committee of the Southern Publishers' association.

NO EVIDENCE FOUND BY POLICE OR GUARD OFFICERS OF I. W. W. INVASION

MESSAGE FROM MINING TOWNS GIVES NO SIGN

Letter Received By American Legion in Spokane Threatens Eight Former Soldiers With Same Fate as Centralia Soldiers Had.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) SPOKANE, Nov. 15.—No evidence of the reported invasion of I. W. W. here from Northwest cities is apparent here today. Neither police nor National Guard officers knew of any disturbances. Two companies of National Guard are still under arms, following reports last night of the intended invasion.

SEATTLE, Nov. 15.—Telephone message from Curberland, a mining town, today said that there was no sign of the I. W. W. invasion which had been reported as planned yesterday.

SEATTLE, Nov. 15.—Renewed activity by both factions Friday marked the fight in the northwest of the government agents against the I. W. W. organization. The establishment of the Seattle Union Record was seized for the second time in 24 hours and the American Legion in Spokane received a letter in which eight local members of the organization were threatened with the fate of former soldiers killed at Centralia Tuesday. The plant of the newspaper was seized by John M. Boyle, United States marshal, and publication stopped.

VIRGINIA SENATOR APPOINTED SUCCESSOR

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—Appointment of a senator from Virginia to succeed the late Senator Martin was tendered Secretary of the Treasury Carter Glass, by Governor Davis. Secretary has not decided whether to accept, according to an announcement made from his office.

WOULD PROTECT GAME WITH LARGE RESERVE

ENTERPRISE, Nov. 15.—Elk still roam the undisputed masters of Billy Meadows, as W. S. Burleigh, deputy game warden, has not been advised how many are to be caught and removed to reserves and parks. Carl D. Shoemaker, state game warden, has received requests for nearly enough to fill one stock car. These will be shipped to various parts of the state. Nothing final has been heard from Wallows, which has planned to fence off the outlet to a mountain canyon and thus create a game reserve which was to be stocked with elk.

As the elk are to be disposed of very shortly, applications must be put in at once. It is believed there are about 150 head of the big deer in the meadows pasture, and all which are not sent to special reserves and parks will be turned out to shift for themselves in Wallows county.

A plan for game reserves in the county to afford permanent protection to elk, deer, grouse and other animals has been proposed by Mr. Burleigh. When the elk are turned out he would have the Chasimus district created a game refuge for a period, say, three years, during which no hunting of any kind should be permitted. At the end of this period, the district would be opened for a short hunting season, and at the same time another protected reserve would be created elsewhere in the county. Thus, in turn, the Chasimus, the Sheep creek country, that between Tunnah and Snake river, Mt. creek, and so on could be made game refuges for a term. There always would be one reserve, in which the game would be reproducing from which other parts of the county would be stocked.
