The Sex of an Egg.
According to the Paris Academy of Science the sex of eggs laid by pure-bred fowls may be determined by weight and size. A test is to hold the egg in the left hand in the sun or close to an electric or gas light. Shade the end of the egg with the right hand, and look for the air space or "setting" (a dark, watery spot larger than a ten-cent piece); if this is found on the top it is a male, but if lower down the side it is a female egg.

Tree Trunks Made Cisterns.
The gigantic baobab tree of central Africa, the trunk of which sometimes attains a diameter of forty feet, often serves as a natural cistern, retaining rain-water in large quantities in a cavity formed at the top of the broad trunk. Taking the hint thus afforded by nature, the Arabs artificially hollow out the huge baobabs and fill them with water during the prevalence of rains, as a provision against the dry season. These cisterns are in many cases twenty feet in height and eight or ten feet in diameter.

GERMANS FEAR TRADE PLANS

BUSINESS MEN ARE WORRYING. ALIENS MAY LEARN.

Germany's Numerous Trade Secrets May Slip Out Through Area. Occupied By the Allies.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) COBLENZ, Nov. 16.—German business men have been worrying more than usual recently for fear their trade secrets will become known to the Allies through "the gap in the west," as the occupied area is called.

According to information reaching the headquarters of the American forces in Germany there is a feeling of uneasiness among the German business men that numerous trade secrets, including the dye industry, which Germany has always carefully guarded, may become available to foreign concerns through the visits paid to German factories by Entente economic missions.

Recent instruction published by the Inter-Allied Rhineland High Commission provide that no obstacles shall be placed in the way of commercial and other missions authorized by the Allied and associated governments entering German factories "with the owners' consent."

These instructions confirm the right provided by the Armistice to search German factories for material taken during the war from invaded regions of France and Belgium and for the supervision of factories by the economic sections of the armies if there should be reason to believe that war materials are being produced.

However, it is not determined that the German factory owners within the occupied regions have a legal right to object, if they so choose, to Entente commercial representatives visiting their plants and thus finding out the special technical processes, which are the secret possession of many industries in this section of Germany, notably of the steel and iron works of the lower Rhine valley. Now the German manufacturers along the Rhine are endeavoring to devise a scheme to prevent the economic mission from visiting their plants whenever they so desire without any formal notice to the factory owners.
