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TREATY IS DEFEATED BY SENATE

WILSON ASKS ADMINISTRATION SENATORS TO VOTE AGAINST RATIFICATION.

LODGE BELIEVES SENATE WILL NOT "OBEY ORDERS"

Wilson Says That Reservations Mean Nullification Instead of Ratification of Treaty—Lodge Claims That They Americanize It and Make It Safe for the United States.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The resolutions of ratification of the peace treaty containing the Lodge reservations were rejected by the senate today. The vote was thirty-nine for the treaty and forty-four against it. Four Democrats, Gore, Shields, Smith of Georgia and Walsh of Massachusetts voted with thirty-five republicans for its adoption.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—A letter from President Wilson advising the administration senators to vote against the ratification of the treaty with foreign relations committee reservations was laid before a conference of administration senators today by Democratic leader, Hitchcock. The committee program, the President wrote, would provide, not for the ratification, "but rather for the nullification of the treaty." After the letter was read there were indications that unless a compromise could be effected the administration senators would line up almost solidly against the ratification.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Republican leader Lodge, in a formal statement, predicted that the senate would not "obey orders" of President Wilson with regard to the treaty. "The senate has equal power and responsibility with the president in making of treaties," Lodge said. "They will not in my opinion, obey the orders of the President, who undertakes to command the senate to ratify the treaty without reservations, adopted by the large majority of the senate, which Americanize it, and make it safe for the United States."

GANTENBIEN DIED TODAY

STATE CIRCUIT COURT JUDGE DIES SUDDENLY.

Well Known Jurist. Was One Time Dean of the Oregon Law School in Portland.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) PORTLAND, Nov. 19.—Judge Calvin U. Gantenbien, of Department six of the state circuit court, died suddenly this morning at his home. Judge Gantenbien was one of the most prominent jurists on the Pacific coast, having been Dean of the University of Oregon Law School while it was in Portland and a judge in the State Circuit Court for a number of years.

He was also an ardent military man having served with the Second Oregon in the Philippines. During the recent war with Germany he was offered a place in the Judge Advocate office at Washington but he refused.

HUN INDUSTRY HAS PROBLEM

Industrial Committee Passes Draft for Law Making Employees Council Compulsory.

BERLIN, Nov. 19.—The German industrial world is confronted with a problem in the organization and operation of councils of wage earners and employees in many lines of industry. The National Assembly or Reichstag will be called upon to determine whether such councils shall be made compulsory by law. This is regarded here as one of the most difficult questions confronting the legislators of the republic.

The committee on Industrial Councils of the National Assembly has approved a draft of a proposed law by which a council of employees would be compulsory in every business establishment employing more than 25 persons.

German newspapers express grave doubt as to whether the council system will prove a success and assert that the newspaper industry is threatened with strikes because of personal political differences among their employees. The plan of permitting councils of employees to have a voice in the control of industries was sponsored and originated by the Majority Socialist Party. Recently their own plan has reacted against them for the Independent Socialists have obtained control of the employees' councils in some metal working plants and have ruled that Majority Socialists must be dismissed. When the employers endeavored to assert the principle that they should hire men for they could do, not because of their politics, the Independent Socialists replied that it would be better for members of one political faith only to be employed in a factory so that no time would be lost in political arguments.

The councils in two of these metal working shops have unanimously voted that members of only one party shall be employed. In those establishments the trend of many of the councils is frankly directed against the employment of women in positions which men can fill. The council of one of the leading hotels in Berlin is composed of a waiter, painter and a female. It recently demanded the dismissal of a married woman who with her husband worked in the hotel on the ground that both would not draw salaries. After the woman priestess of the demand was withdrawn but the council compelled the manager of the hotel to dismiss two competent women employees and replace them with men.

GARFIELD URGES ADJUSTMENT OF DIFFERENCES BE MADE AT ONCE.

COUNTRY NEEDS COAL TO KEEP UP INDUSTRY

Bituminous Coal Supplies at Lake Docks May Be Held For Industries There Regardless of the Need in the Northwest, According to Fuel Order at Duluth.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Scale committees of the bituminous miners and operators of the entire competitive field went into an executive session to negotiate a wage contract, after Federal Fuel Administrator Garfield had urged upon them the necessity for an adjustment of differences and the producing of coal for the country's needs.

DULUTH, Nov. 19.—All supplies of bituminous coal from the docks at the heads of the Lakes all more than to the industries here than to the industries of the northwest, which are regarded unessential, were cut off under an order issued today by the chairman of the local fuel distribution committee.

SCHOOL CENSUS GIVES BAKER OVER 12,500

BAKER, Nov. 19.—Based upon the school census this population of more than 12,500 according to A. C. Strange, school superintendent who says that although the census is not yet complete it will show more than 2,500 children of school age.

Universal estimates place the average of children of school age as one to every four adults, making an average of five people inclusive of each child. The increase over 1918 it is believed, will be more than 100 children, which means more than 500 in population. Mr. Strange says that the local school census is not yet segregated by sexes.

AUSTRIAN MONEY NOW BEER LABELS

VIENNA, Nov. 19.—A Vienna story from a Swiss brewery has adopted the custom of pasting on its bottles, instead of labels, Austrian one crown notes, which are valued in Switzerland at something less than seven and one-half cents. The former label of the brewery cost something like ten centimes.

SHERIFFS FIRE ON STRIKERS

STEEL STRIKERS ARE FIRED UPON DURING ATTACK

One Striker Is Wounded When Deputy Sheriff Taken by Steel Workers at Youngstown.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) YOUNGSTOWN, Nov. 19.—Deputy Sheriff opened fire on the steel strikers early today during attacks upon negro workmen who were leaving the east Youngstown plant. One striker was shot in the leg and one negro is in the hospital.

KALCHAK HAS NARROW ESCAPE

HAND GRENADES THROWN AT ADMIRAL KILL SOLDIERS.

Attempt to Assassinate Head of Russian Government Reported From Moscow.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) LONDON, Nov. 19.—An attempt to assassinate Admiral Kolchak, head of the Russian government which until recently maintained its capital at Omsk, was reported in a wireless dispatch from Moscow. Hand grenades were thrown at him. Six soldiers were killed and twelve wounded.

PERUVIAN ASSEMBLY APPROVES TREATY

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The treaty of Versailles was approved unanimously by the Peruvian National assembly yesterday, according to advices received by the Peruvian embassy here.

EUGENE HIGH MAY WIN CHAMPIONSHIP

EUGENE, Nov. 19.—The Eugene high school football team won from the Lebanon team on the latter's home grounds Saturday afternoon by the score of 19 to 4.

The Eugene boys returned home, reporting an exceedingly rough game, and some of the members of the team are suffering from injuries. This was one of the roughest games some of the boys ever participated in, they say. It is determined to win by fair means or foul, but the Eugene aggregation had too much football knowledge for them, and won despite the roughness of the other players.

Lebanon's four points were made by two safeties, which are not scored very often. Eugene made three touchdowns but kicked only one goal.

The Eugene team has a very good record so far and may stand a chance for the championship of the high schools in the western part of the state.

CENTRALIA STILL WANT TWO I.W.W.'S.

BERT BLAND, SUSPECTED SLAYER OF CHIMPA, TAKEN BY SHERIFF.

INQUEST PROVES HANEY WAS VICTIM OF OWN MAN

Two Alleged Industrial Workers Workers Are Still Being Searched for in Connection With Armistice Day Shooting—A Charge of Murder Will Be Placed Against Them

CENTRALIA, Nov. 19.—Two alleged Industrial Workers are still wanted here to face the charge of murder in connection with the Armistice Day shooting, are Ole Hansen and John Doe Davis. An unconfirmed report said Davis had been taken by Sheriff Berry. Bland, notorious I. W. W. fugitive is suspected slayer of Lieut. Warren O. Grimm, one of the four American Legion paraders killed here Armistice day, was taken with out a fight late Tuesday by Sheriff John Berry and a company of deputies. Bland is in the county jail at Chehalis.

According to Sheriff Berry, Bland was found in a cabin 12 miles northwest of Independence, and is supposed to have taken refuge there Monday after he was seen near Rochester and Peking Junction, where he was driven forth to seek food. Posing in the mountains region northwest of this city, where I. W. W. fugitives are still believed to be in hiding, sought for the Armistice day murders, have been to a large extent withdrawn, according to Lieut. Frank Van Gilder, in charge of the search parties.

But the search for the two or three radicals yet at large and who have been accused of participating in the killing of the four ex-servicemen, has not been abandoned. It will be concentrated, with a smaller number of men in the field, that accidental shooting of possession such as the late that overtook John Hanev, volunteer from the Tenino district, may not happen, Capt. By art said.

The sorrowful sequel to the fatal death of Hanev, who was slain last Saturday in the mistaken killing between two squads of deputies at Hunter's cabin, 23 miles northwest of here, came Tuesday afternoon when Corporal Livingstone held the inquest. The verdict was that Hanev came to his death by the rifle fire of other deputies after he had failed to respond to signals previously arranged, and had been mistaken for an I. W. W. fugitive.

Bland was armed, it is understood, and had a plentiful supply of cartridges. Making sure of his luck, he placed, after the trail from Rochester had been traced, Sheriff Berry gathered his posse and drove with

U.S. FEDERAL LAW TO PROMOTE BY STRIKES.

Wash. Every Means of Conciliation Tried Before Strikers are Called.

SECRET AGENTS ARE FOUND DEAD

BODIES OF MEXICAN AGENTS FOUND HANGING FROM TREE

Military Officials Believe That Men Were Murdered by Bandits.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) AGUA PRIETA SONORA, Nov. 19.—The bodies of Enrique Hernandez and Francisco Arillo, Secret agents of the Mexican government, have been found hanging from a tree in the hills twenty miles south of Tuxtepec, according to information received through military channels. Military officials believe the men were murdered by bandits.

BALTIC TROOPS HEAD TOWARD BERLIN

PLAN CHANGE OF MEETING DATE

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH FAVORS EXTENSION OF SESSIONS

Change Will Enable Ministers to Attend Synodical Meetings During Vacation.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—A plan to change the meeting date of synods and also extend the length of synodical sessions has been approved by several state bodies of the Presbyterian church in the U. S. A. The change is from the autumn to the summer season and for the purpose of enabling ministers and others to be present to attend during their vacation period when more time can be spared for study.

The idea is to furnish the routine business of the synod in record time and devote the remainder of the session to a graduate school for ministers, in which classes in Presbyterian home missions, foreign missions and other essential church work will be conducted. The former session of from two to three days will be extended to ten days and a regular course of study outlined.

Two states, Washington and Oregon, have tried out this plan and found it to work successfully. The interest was increased and greater attendance was shown. The ministers were found to return to their parishes with renewed vigor and spiritual and mental strength for the following year.

North Dakota, New Mexico and Arizona have decided to adopt this plan and will put it into effect at their next year's meetings. The synods of Oregon will meet at Eugene, the synod of North Dakota at Jamestown, the synod of New Mexico at Santa Fe, and the synod of Utah at Salt Lake City. The other meeting places will be determined later.

20,000 TROOPS GONE BOLSHEVIKI REPORT

20,000 Troops Gone to Bolsheviks
The Bolsheviks have captured 20,000 troops of the White army, it was reported here Monday night. The troops were captured in the region of the Volga river. The Bolsheviks are now advancing on Moscow.

"REDS" PLOT UNCOVERED BY POLICE

EXPLOSIVES TO BE MAILED IN CHRISTMAS PACKAGES TO FEDERAL OFFICIALS.

INFORMATION SHOWS PLOT IS NATION WIDE

Philadelphia Police Superintendent Announces Information That He Considers Reliable, Revealing Plan to Slay Federal, State and City Officials.

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 19.—Discovery of a "Red" plot to slay officials with explosives in Christmas mail packages was announced today by Superintendent of Police James Robinson. Information of the plot, which he considers reliable, indicates it is a nation-wide. It is directed against federal, state and city authorities who have participated in the national roundup of radicals who are planning to overthrow the government.

COURT APPEALS ORDER STAYING INJUNCTION

(By Associated Press to The Observer.) BOSTON, Nov. 19.—The United States Circuit Court appeals issued an order staying the execution of the preliminary injunction granted by Judge Arthur L. Brown, restraining federal officials of Rhode Island from enforcing the Volstead prohibition act.

LA GRANDE MAN WILL WRESTLE PLESTINA

PENDLETON, Nov. 19.—Marin Plestina, whose weight is 220 pounds and who is recognized as the heavyweight champion of the world, will meet Mike Howard, of La Grande, weight 202 pounds, former Greco-Roman heavyweight champion of Europe next Tuesday at the Oregon theatre in a wrestling match which is under the management of Lloyd Ireland of this city. The match will be for two falls out of three.

Should Howard succeed in throwing Plestina in one fall he will be presented with \$1,000 which J. C. Marsh, Plestina's manager, has promised to go to any heavyweight in the world who can pin Plestina's shoulders to the mat. The sum of \$25,000 has been paid with the Empire Trust Company, of New York, by Mr. McFadden, founder of the Physical Culture Magazine, to back Plestina against any man, Zybysko, Stretcher, Carl Dockock or Straghan Lewis, preferred.
