FOOD DRUG ACT IS EXTENDED

CALDER BILL PROTECTS INTER-STATE COMMERCE

Extends the Provisions of the Food and Drugs Act of 1906 to Cover Package Foods.

"A bill to protect interstate commerce in foods, drugs and medicines, and to extend the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act of June 30, 1906."

"Be it enacted, etc.: 'Sec. 1. That no law of any state, city or municipality, relating to the adulterations or misbranding of foods, drugs, or medicines, or regulating the branding thereof, shall apply to, or interfere with, the sale of any foods, drugs, or medicines, in package form, which have been transported in interstate commerce, and thereby have become subject to the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act of June 30, 1906, (34 Statutes at Large, page 768), and which are not adulterated or misbranded within the meaning of this act, as now amended, or as the same may be hereafter amended, so long as said articles remain in package form and not adulterated as aforesaid. The words 'in package form' as used herein shall be held to include the individual package in which or from which the articles are sold to the ultimate consumer."

"Sec. 2. All the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act of June 30, 1906, are hereby extended so as to apply wherever applicable to all foods, drugs and medicines in package form, which have become subject to the provisions of said act until said products have

been sold and delivered to the ultimate consumer thereof."

TEACHING IN JAPAN

Harold Newton, Former La Grande Boy, Writes of Work in Osaka, UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, EV

Nov. 18, Harold Newton, University of Oregon graduate in the class of 1910, is having many experiences as teacher of English in Osaka, Japan, where less than 50 foreigners reside in the city of 2,000,000 inhabitants.

"The Japanese have a great interest in learning English, especially conversational," he writes to Dean Eric W. Allen of the school of Journalism

"All of those who can afford it, can obtain instructors, are trying to learn our language. It is even compulsory in the schools. Imagine Americans being compelled to learn Japanese."

Newton states that he teaches a few hours a week at one government school, the Tennoji-chu gaku, and spends the rest of his working time at private schools and among business men and bankers.

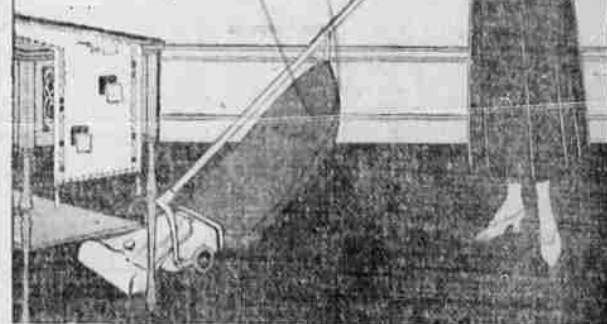
IRRIGATION SUIT IS FILED IN BAKER
