(Continued from Page 1) out ratification without reservation which got only 38 votes to 53 opposing it. Only one Republican, Senator McCumber, North Dakota, voted with the Democrats in its support. Republican Leader Lodge declared Wednesday's voting constituted a final decision on the peace treaty unless President Wilson circumvented the senate rules by withdrawing it and then submitting it again to the senate. In other quarters there was some difference of opinion but the general sentiment seemed to be that there was only a slender chance that the treaty would come up at the beginning of the next session of congress, he gaining next month.
