#### SOLDIERS NOT TO BE FOOLED

congress showing the ex-soldier to become amenable and make him ask for what the ex-soldier understood it was the wish of the people he should have. Consequently, after much debate in those points, in which the delegates "spoke out in meeting" they approved the resolution asking for more legislation on a bonus as well as on a home loan bill, refusing point blank to name any sum as congress and they would do.

With respect to the soldier's bureau of the Federal government, the convention for the first time definitely placed the burden on congress where it belongs. An element of criticism has run over the country directed at the Bureau of War Risk Insurance and the federal board for vocational rehabilitation, which has to do with the retraining and readjusting of wounded soldiers, sailors and marines. The report approved at the convention asks the federal board a clean bill of health and only ask better legislative co-operation on the part of congress.

The report asked the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, represented at the convention by its director, Colonel R. G. Chalmers-Jones, to see what could be done by way of reducing rates. Then it asked congress to act speedily on the beneficial legislation that has been recommended. It asked particularly that the Sweet bills, giving higher compensation to totally disabled men, and permitting the payment of war insurance in a lump sum, as recommended by the bureau, be immediately passed by the senate, where it is being held up by the Smoot subcommittee of the Appropriations committee. With these things done the approved report declared War Risk would be a desirable boon to the soldier and it demanded that congress act busy immediately.
