He was much surprised when he found himself elected to the state senate from old Union. It was an historic session of the legislature, the first ever Senator Oliver attended. Among other things it handled its appropriation measures so that an extra session had to be called a few days after the meeting adjourned. This added attraction fixed the bills in true and lawful form. Another thing the regular session did was to pass the noted nine-foot shoe law and the four-ropes bill. The senator from Union county was for 'em in those days, who traveled about the state often slept in country hotels, where the sheets hardly reached down to their knees. It was to provide a covering from cats' paws that prompted the passage of the bill. It still clings to the statute books, but the rope law was killed at the special session. This provided that there should be a rope in each room that could be used as a fire-escape. When the hotel caught fire the chamber maids would awaken the guest, who would awaken the guest, who would go to the window, tie his suitcase onto the end of the rope, throw it to the ground, then crawl down the rope. It was too slow a method."
