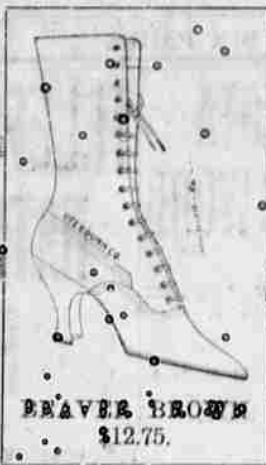

#### SIXTY-NINTH CONGRESS CONvenes

to enact several measures before the holiday adjournment, to begin about December 20 and continue to January 5.

Long debate on the railroad bill in the senate was anticipated and leaders had little hope of its enactment before January 1, the date of which the President has said the roads would be returned to private operation. A temporary resolution authorizing guaranty of compensation for the carriers until permanent legislation is completed will be passed if necessary.

Among the measures expected to be completed this month are the oil, coal, gas and phosphate land leasing bill and the bill authorizing formation of corporations to finance American export trade. Both bills are now in conference.

Includes the treaty of Versailles, several other treaties are pending and promise to occupy long senate debate. Three treaties, one guaranteeing assistance to France in event of German aggression, that establishing Poland and defining the Rhine frontier and the long pending \$25,000,000 Cambodian loan, are pending before the foreign relations committee.

The peace treaty with Austria also is expected to be ready for transmission by the President soon. The committee also has before it the resolution by Republican Leader Lodge proposing that congress, by concurrent resolution, declare the war with Germany ended. This will be fought vigorously by the administration. Early action on the French treaty is not planned by the committee majority, but the bill treaty, the leaders say, will be passed.

Among other important international matters pending or in prospect are the house bill to repeal the Canadian reciprocity treaty and commercial conventions and trade extensions arrangements with the allies, the enemy countries and the nations.

On the legislative calendar are many measures already passed either by Senate or House. The Senate bills providing a permanent shipping policy, regulating cold storage of food products, and providing for development of waterpower.

### Keeping Us Out of War

The interesting fact is disclosed by the Navy Department that the United States is now building a great dreadnaught which will far exceed the British battleship Hood, the pride of the British navy. And this concurrently with the administration's stand for perpetual peace through a covenant which, as brought back from Versailles, would permanently entangle the United States in the controversies of Europe.

The newest American sea fighter is to be of 43,000 tons displacement, as compared with the 42,000 tons displacement of the Hood, and will carry twelve 16-inch guns, whereas the Hood has only eight 15-inch guns.

As a part of the permanent peace program of the United States navy this monster battleship in course of construction forms a most impressive exhibit and object lesson.

the most question of universal training, soon are to be brought out by the senate and house military committees, while the committee must pass on a new building program and on bills increasing the navy's personnel and its pay.

Prominent among the other measures to be taken up are those dealing with radical aliens and anarchists, and the high cost of living. Leaders also plan to give attention to means of averting industrial strikes by federal mediation or other methods. The Lane-Monroe bill embodying Secretary Lant's plan of farms for soldiers and sailors also is up for passage and congress will attempt revision of several standing laws and repeal of the espionage and other war measures.

Numerous investigations also are pending. Senate inquiries into Mexican affairs and the coal, wheat and sugar situations will continue while the house will carry on its investigation of War Department activities. New investigations proposed in the senate include that into the print paper situation and into charges by Senator Watson, of Indiana, that socialists and radicals are in the employ of the Federal Trade Commission. The senate privileges and elections committee plans to take up the contest filed by Henry Ford against the election of Senator Newberry, Republican, of Michigan.

Senate Democrats are to hold a conference this week to elect a leader to succeed the late Senator Martin, of Virginia, with the contest apparently narrowed to Senator Hitchcock, Democrat, of Nebraska, administration leader in the peace treaty fight, and Senator Underwood, of Alabama, for Democratic leader in the house.

### LARGE AIRSHIP BELONGS TO U.S.

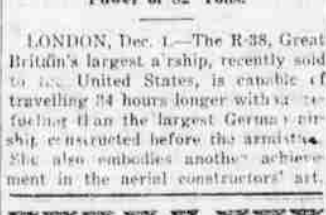
R-38 BOUGHT FROM GREAT BRITAIN RECENTLY.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The R-38, Great Britain's largest airship, recently sold to the United States, is capable of traveling 24 hours longer with a fuel tank than the largest German airship constructed before the armistice. She also embodies another achievement in the aerial constructors' art.

With her enormous gas capacity of 2,720,000 cubic feet, a third larger than the R-34, of trans-Atlantic fame, the R-38 has a lifting power of 50 tons of cargo. This is 60 per cent of her total lifting power, 82 tons. The airship's weight, 32 tons, is reckoned as dead liftage.

The sale is attributed to demands for economy that have been made on the British air ministry. Construction of the R-38 was begun last year at Inchinnan, on the Clyde, where the R-34 was built. Her cruising endurance will be 45 miles per hour for nearly nine days. In length she is 695 feet, or 25 feet longer than the R-34, and her girth is 87 feet, six inches. The airship is equipped with four 350-horsepower Sunbeam engines and two 275-horsepower Sunbeam Maori engines. Altogether she will develop a horsepower of nearly 2000. Her speed will be 75 miles per hour.
