Formal resolutions effecting the primary east and west roads were adopted as follows:

Resolution. WHEREAS: The County Courts of Baker, Grant, Malheur, and Union counties; the Commercial club of Ontario, the Vale Chamber of Commerce, the Commercial clubs of Canyon City, Prairie City and John Day, the Commercial clubs of Huntington, Halfway and Richland; the Baker county Chamber of Commerce; the Union County Ad Club; the Improvement Clubs of Riverdale and Oregon Slope, together with a large number of citizens of said counties, having met at Baker, Oregon, on the 11th day of January 1921, for the purpose of considering the interests of this portion of the state of Oregon, in the highway program of said state; and having considered said matters in detail and at great length, do now hereby

RESOLVE, that the Old Oregon Trail section of the Columbia River Highway from the Union-Umatilla county line to Ontario be completed as soon as it is possible for the commission to do so; and be it further

RESOLVED, that that portion of said highway from Huntington, Oregon, to Ontario, Oregon, be an all Oregon road contemplated in the original proposal of the Highway Commission to the people of Malheur county when they voted upon a bond issue to provide funds for their cooperation in the construction of said highway and by the resolution of the Highway Commission and of the intention of the Legislature; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the John Day Highway be completed across Grant county and to the Idaho line and that the same be permanently designated east from Prairie City to Unity and we would recommend that what is known as the Davis Creek or Alternate route be adopted for the reason that the preliminary surveys and estimates of the Forest Service engineers indicate that this will be the cheapest and most feasible route, and we urge that surveys of this route be made as soon as possible that construction be commenced soon thereafter, and be it further

RESOLVED, that that portion of the Central Oregon Highway from Harper, Oregon to Vale, Oregon, at the junction of the John Day Highway be constructed in cooperation with the County Court of Malheur county, the county funds for which were provided by the taxpayers of Malheur county at the election held for that purpose on May 1919 to cooperate with the state Highway Commissioner.

STATE HOUSE, Salem, Jan. 13.—(Special Correspondence.)—By all means the crust of harmony and oneness of thought has to break. Sometimes it breaks in different opinion on legislation and sometimes otherwise. This time it was otherwise.

When the senate convened this morning and worked out a few measures that had been deposited by the office of lawmaking on the chief clerk's desk, it was apparent things were about ready for a motion to recess.

Senator Thomas, with his remarkable oratory, addressed the chair and, for twenty minutes, succeeded to skin C. C. Chapman and the Oregon Voter in a way that would have made John J. Ingalls, himself gone by, take deep interest. The senator took for his text the attack of Mr. Chapman on Senator Jones in a recent issue of the Voter, claiming that it was libelous, mean, contemptible and a lot more very effective phrases which only a legal mind can grasp and is far out of reach of an ordinary newspaperman like ourselves.

The speech was closed with a motion of confidence in the integrity and ability of Senator Jones, which carried almost unanimously and gave several members of the senate opportunity to state their views and opinions about newspapers in general and some in particular.

Chapman seemed to be alone, so hot were the words of contempt from many of the lawmakers. A few of us new members, although having also received what Chapman would only call "friendly criticism," began to feel that pronounced Eastern Oregon sympathy for the underdog arose in us, so few were there who seemed to have anything but bitter denunciation for the Voter and its editor.
