MALHEUR AND HARNEY OPEN

Large 6,000 acres of desert lands in the Vale and Burns land districts will be open to public entry for the 21-day period from February 25 to March 17, according to an announcement made by Harry E. Loughlin, chief of the Portland field division of the general land office.

Filings on land may be presented during the 20 days preceding, or from February 5 to February 24, at the Portland land office. If any land remains unentered March 18, it will be open on 30-day days to settlement and all proper forms of entry and selection by the general public. The area is subject to an easement for the Warm Springs reservoir. The lands are along the Malheur river and are mountainous. The nearest town is Riverside on the Oregon Eastern branch of the Union Pacific system.

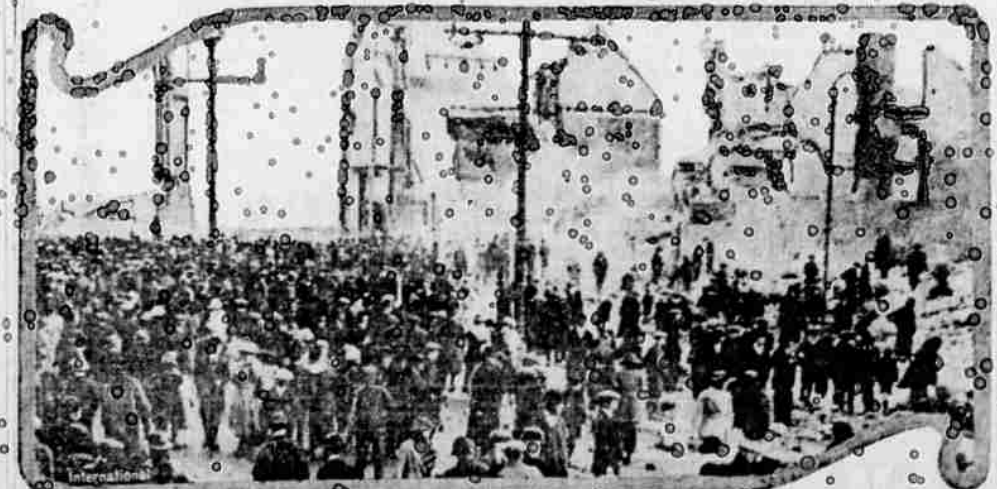
Cats and Diphtheria.
Cats don't carry diphtheria, declares Doctor Savage, medical officer of health for Somerset county, England. In an address to the Royal Sanitary Institute Doctor Savage stated that, even when cats were closely associated with diphtheria patients, the true diphtheria bacillus could not be found in their throats. He had tried to infect cats with human diphtheria, but had failed.

To Quench Thirst.
