## WIN SCOUT ESSAY PRIZES

Scout Lewis Adam Vincent, of Portland, Ore., is the winner of the first prize in the national essay contest conducted by the national board of fire underwriters, among the members of the Boy Scouts of America. The subject of the contest was "Fire Prevention." Scout Vincent's essay, a complete and original outline, consisting of 10 articles, is the best prize essay in the contest. The prize money is \$100, which is divided into that many shares by the scout organization.

The other district winners are: Henry H. Colman, Jr., Jersey City, N. J.; Stephen W. Johnson, Wm. G. Jones, N. Y.; John W. Phillips, Philadelphia, Pa.; William A. Ayres, Upland, Ind.; Cecil C. Huntcutt, Gilmer, N.C.; Clifford H. House, Jr., of Covington, Ky.; and William Blake, Fox Lake, Wis. The board of judges reduced the better essays to 16 in number for the final decision. Each of the judges then indicated his preference by marking the essays that he considered best in the order of his first and succeeding choices. In order to insure fairness the entries were marked for identification by number only, the judges not knowing who had written the compositions. Scout Vincent's essay received a total of 15 points and, his nearest competitors were Henry F. Howe with 12 points.
