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EAST OREGON HIGH TEAMS ARE WINNERS

PENDLETON BEGINS TO LOOK OVER POSSIBILITIES.

Baker, Pendleton and La Grande, Three Strong Rivals So Far. Undeclared.

PENDLETON, Jan. 22.—Baker and La Grande high schools, time-honored rivals in Eastern Oregon, are starting their respective basketball schedules with some good sized wins. Neither has met quite as stiff opposition as Pendleton did in its first game, but from indications the boys' east of here will put up some pretty interesting arguments when they meet the locals in the hoop game.

Baker took on Haines and North Powder in its first two games. Haines was defeated by a 51 to 9 score and North Powder fell, 80 to 5. Baker also trimmed Union, another small high school, 38 to 6. In a return game with North Powder on their own floor, Baker won a second time, 61 to 10.

Keep Down Rival Scores.
So far the Baker boys, in their four games, have not allowed an opponent to roll up even 10 points. Only once, on the other hand, has Baker scored less than 50 points in a game. This requires lots of basket shooting and from indications, Ad Dewey has a quietest that can find the hoop.

La Grande is not reckoned as strong as Baker, owing to the loss of practically all the good men from last year. Wallowa and Elgin both fell before the La Grande team last week end, the score against Wallowa being 31 to 15 and against Elgin 18 to 16.

Bud Theisen, only veteran on the La Grande squad, sprained his ankle and was out of the lineup in both contests.

This week-end La Grande is journeying again out the Enterprise branch. It will meet Enterprise on Friday night and go on to Joseph for a game on Saturday night. None of these small places produce a championship team ordinarily and La Grande expects to win both. Union will be met by La Grande a week from Friday.

Weiser and Baker Listed.
Weiser sends a basketball team to meet Baker Friday night at Baker and this is to be the first tough game of the season. Dope from Baker is that Pendleton high school will show there on the nights of Feb. 16 and 17. The Baker team is scheduled to play here on Feb. 4 and 5. They will play a return game at Weiser on Feb. 25. Pendleton's team will have a chance to show its calibre this week end when it plays three games in Whitman county, Wash. The boys left Thursday morning for Colfax and from there will go to Pullman to meet the freshman team of W. S. C. Friday night and the Pullman high school Saturday night. It looks now like the tussle for supremacy in this section will lie between Baker and Pendleton, with the possibility that La Grande will show a sudden spurt and register a win over one or the other rivals.

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Silks Are Now On Tobaggan Scale

The bride of the coming month need no longer worry now she will buy the pretty lingerie and negligees so dear to the heart of the bride. Silk goods of all kinds have hit the tobaggan, though many of the merchants are as yet without holding that information.

Sheer chiffon is now selling at \$1 a yard with the mere memory of the \$2 days left far in the past. Crepe de Chine that one time stood on the shelves at \$3.50 and \$4 a yard has now dropped to \$1.50 and \$2 for the special designs. Georgette crepe is now selling for \$1.70 and \$2 when at one time you passed out \$3.50 for the same grade of the same material. Silks in Japan slumped and every slump has its own reflection in other large countries of the world. When the banks refused to issue money on automobiles in the United States it had its effect on Japan, whose chief export is said to be silk.

Wash satin is now selling for \$1.50 and \$2.00 a yard where it used to pass over the counter at \$3 and people were glad to get it for that.

Chettau cloth, once popular silk of the heavier line is now out of

the market. It is in a way replaced by Canton crepe, which is the mingling of the two weaves of crepe de chene and chettau, heavier than crepe de chene, lighter than the once popular chettau.

Japanese and China silk are selling for \$2.00. The market is quite low on these two silks, they have somewhat lost their popularity. One local merchant said that silks had not gone down freely, but that it was being replaced by the more sensible goods such as light woolens and cottons.

The public has always had the impression that there was a "higer" in the woodpile when a certain commodity raised in price over night, and it was very well explained that there was always some football play in merchandise. People themselves are the cause of it, the commodities of the United States have just so many factories to come from. Some days there will be a rush on cotton sheeting, other days other commodities are brought into the race for higher prices, because of this the merchants are forced to pay a higher price for the commodity in question, thus causing the price to raise over night.
