## HILLSDALE MAN GIVEN REWARD

### WALTER JAMES RECEIVES CASH PRIZE REWARD

Examiner in the Red Cross Life Saving Corps Administered Routine First Aid to Injured.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Walter James, of Hillsdale, Oregon, is among those to whom cash prize awards have been made by the American Red Cross for the best general first aid work performed during the year 1920, according to an announcement

made public on January 22. He was awarded third prize.

Mr. James, who is an examiner in the Red Cross Life Saving Corps administered routine first aid to a number of passengers who were severely injured in a head-on collision between two electric trains of the Southern Pacific Co., near Hillsdale, Oregon, on May 9, 1920. Ben C. Dey, General Attorney of the Southern Pacific Lines in Oregon, reported that the good judgment exhibited by Walter James and his tireless efforts extending over several hours, entitled him to the greatest possible commendation. Dr. George Parris, City Health Officer of Portland, Oregon, also reported to the Red Cross the efficiency of the first aid work performed by Mr. James at the time of the wreck.

## "WILDMAN" IS A MYSTERY

### MAN DECLARES HE CAUGHT SPOUSE IN BEAR TRAP.

#### Queer Trio are Dipped from Their Home to Flood, etc.

LAUREL, Miss. Jan. 24.—Surrounded by the comforts of civilization, Albert Parsons, a "wild man of the West" river bottom, and his 50-year-old "wife," whom he says he caught 20 years ago in a bear trap, and a 100-year-old baby girl, all of whom strayed into Lux last week like people from another age, today are as much a mystery to authorities as ever.

Interest centers in the baby's identity. Authorities do not believe she is the child of the couple who although in perfect health, show signs and scars of primitive living. The woman has one eye which she declares was "scratched out by a wildcat."

The man's clothes were in tatters. "The woman wore the scanty remnants of a dress and the baby was naked. They had been driven out of their "home," a shack on a strip of land in a isolated section, by high water. Parsons maintains he owns the land.

The trio had lived principally on roots, wild fruits and game, but there was evidence of an effort to farm with the aid of a blind horse which Parsons said he had "captured."

Although the man's mind is said to be more clearly normal than the woman's he is unable to account for the child.

Stories have been heard for years regarding a "wild man" but they usually were dismissed. The man says he is 72 years old but looks older.

The three are being cared for at the poor house.
