VAST PROGRAM IS ARRANGED

HIGHWAY DEVELOPMENT IN
WESTERN STATES IS TOPIC.

Western States Have Been Lagging
Until Lately in Development
of Highways.

CHICAGO, Ill., Jan. 25.—A vast program of highway development in Western states, particularly those on the Pacific Coast, will be one of the subjects to be thoroughly discussed at the big American Good Roads Congress and National Good Roads Show to be held at the Coliseum in this city, February 9 to 12 next under the auspices of the American Road Builders' Association, the organization of government, state, county and city highway officials, engineers, contractors, and manufacturers of road-building machinery and materials.

Western states, particularly Nevada, Wyoming, Idaho, Utah, Montana, California, Washington and Oregon, by rapid strides are fast coming to the front in road-development. In California, Oregon, Nevada, Utah, Idaho, Montana, Washington and Wyoming, enabling acts, state and county bonds issues and direct levies providing for a total expenditure for good roads amounting to \$114,800,000, have lately been authorized. This is nearly three times the amount set aside by the states of the East and the Atlantic seaboard for highway improvement in 1921 and 1922, and it paves the way for a vast amount of road work during the coming spring and summer that will afford some relief in the West for the condition of unemployment in which unskilled labor, especially in Pacific Coast centers, now finds itself.

The American Road Builders' Association, the oldest and largest organization of its kind back of the good roads movement in the United States and Canada has been urging upon the legislatures of the Western states more extensive legislation in the interest of better highways. In this respect the association has had the moral support to no little extent of the ranchmen, lumbermen, manufacturers and shipping interests, in that section who are interested in improving marketing conditions and who advocate better highways as railroad feeders.

Census figures show that Western states, with the exception of California, until recently, have been lagging behind somewhat in highway development. The backward states in particular have been those of Nevada, with only five tenths of one per cent of her roads surfaced and improved, and Montana, with only four tenths of one per cent.

The governors of California, Nevada, Montana, Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, Oregon and Washington, as well as those of other states and the mayors of all Western cities, as well as the country at large, are being asked by the Governor of Illinois and the Mayor of Chicago, respectively, to send official delegates to the Congress.

The meeting will bring together from every part of the country, the practical and scientific men identified with highway construction and maintenance—the men who will be responsible for the expenditure of the vast sums available for highway work. There they will discuss from every angle the many problems connected with the construction, administration, financing and maintenance of national, state, county and city highways.

The exposition of labor-saving road building and highway transportation machinery and paving materials will occupy more than 40,000 square feet of space on the ground floor at the Coliseum and from the number of exhibits already entered, the show this year promises to surpass by far in number and variety of exhibits the big expositions held by the association in former years at Pittsburgh, St. Louis, Boston, Cincinnati, Louisville and Indianapolis.
