EVER LOYAL TO POLITICS

FRED LOCKLEY INTERVIEWS JUDGE CHAWFORD.

Declares He Moved to La Grande Because He Knew Court House Would Come Here.

Judge T. H. Crawford of this city, is the subject of an article written by Fred Lockley in the Oregon Journal. The career of a prominent citizen who projected in more than one Eastern Oregon country, is told by Mr. Lockley as follows:

"Judge T. H. Crawford of La Grande was a guest at the Imperial a few days. He was on his way home from California. 'What did I go down to California for?' said the Judge. 'Well, to tell you the real truth, I went down to visit and play with my grandchildren. How long have I been in La Grande? I have been there so long that I am the sole survivor of the attorneys who were practicing in Union, Baker and Umatilla counties when I went up to Eastern Oregon. When I went up to Baker City, as they called it for I moved there first, before going to La Grande—Stearns & Hattery were the leading lawyers there. Judge Hattery later went to Pendleton. Two other prominent lawyers of Baker City in those days were A. J. Lawrence and John Shinn. The latter was the leading lawyer at Pendleton. Luther B. Loop, who was county clerk of Baker county when I went up there, was admitted to the bar in the same class I was and became district attorney."

"W. J. Bryan and I were both on March 18, though I received notice that did not distinguish between 1848 and came to Oregon in 1879. I moved from Baker to Union, which was the county seat of Union county, where I practiced law. Knowing the sentiment of the county, I realized that La Grande was to be the county seat, so I went over to La Grande to wait for the county seat to come over, which it did. I was appointed by Governor Chamberlain judge of the circuit court. By the way, I was a classmate of Robert S. Bean, judge of the United States district court. I was graduated from the Oregon Agricultural college in 1874. President Finley was president of the college when I entered. Professor H. L. Arnold of Virginia was president when I graduated. Robert Veach of Cottage Grove was one of the first graduates of the college, which in those days was run by the Methodist Episcopal Church. South W. K. Weatherford of Albany was graduated in the class just before me, as was also W. D. Horton, now general attorney of the Southern Pacific."

"I guess you can put me in the lone-survivor class, for Judge Olin, who died a few years ago, was one of the last survivors of the old regime when the whole country east of the Cascades was in one judicial district."
