LAST ROUND-UP CAUSED DEFICIT

STOCKHOLDERS OF WESTERN SHOW HOLD MEETING

H. W. Collins, leader—Named as Head of the Organization—Dates Set For This Year's Show.

PENDLETON, Jan. 27.—The annual meeting of the stockholders and directors of the Northwestern Frontier Exhibition Assn., presenting annually the Round-Up, held Tuesday night, resulted in the reelection of Henry W. Collins, president; George C. Baer, vice-president; R. E. Chloupek, treasurer, and Charles C. Marsh, secretary. All directors had previously been re-elected by the stockholders last night and are: H. W. Collins, competitive events; George C. Baer, business manager; R. E. Chloupek, finances; C. H. Marsh, office and publicity manager; J. H. Estes, parks; L. G. Frazier, grounds; D. S. Tatum, accommodations; Chancey Bishop, Indians; S. R. Thompson, livestock; J. W. Earl, non-competitive events.

Confirmation of the Round-Up dates set for September 22, 23 and 24, 1921, was voted last night and the financial report audited gratuitously by Whitfield, Whitcombe & Co., was accepted.

Most notable decision of the director voted is probably the increase in the charge for reserved grandstand admissions, which have been raised to \$2 plus war tax. The price was formerly \$1.50.

Accounts of the association, audited by Whitfield, Whitcombe & Co., show that there is a surplus on hand of \$9,636.64, with the total assets set at \$12,246.65, showing a decrease in assets of \$531.97 since 1919. Liabilities are capital stock of 500 shares at \$10 each, of which there is issued and fully paid \$3,210.00.

Deficit in the 1920 show amounted to \$2,536.63 and is shown in revenues \$42,149.65 and total expenses \$45,686.28. Stockholders are well pleased with the report, since it was assumed that the deficit was heavier on account of bad weather during the show.

Receipts for Thursday, the first day of the show were \$11,518.30; for Friday, \$14,935.40 and for Saturday, \$20,231.10, making the total gate receipts \$46,712.80, out of which the government war tax was taken, leaving \$41,239.50 as gate receipts. Other sources of revenue, such as concessions, raised the figure.
