TESTS ARE MADE FOR CURING MEAT

SUGAR SUBSTITUTES CAN BE
USED SUCCESSFULLY.

Bacon Cured With Corn Sugar Is
Considered "Of Slightly
Better Flavor."

That several sugar substitutes can be used successfully in place of cane sugar for curing meats is indicated by experiments recently made by specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture. It was found that ham and sweet pickle bacon when cured with dextrose, or refiners' syrup, compared favorably with meats cured with cane sugar. The experiments throw considerable light on opportunities for conserving large quantities of sugar in case sugar saving should again become a national problem, the specialists say.

The experiments are regarded as of preliminary nature and while the results indicate strongly that several substitutes can be used successfully instead of cane sugar, department specialists say it is advisable for meat packing establishments to conduct curing tests on a moderate scale before curing large quantities of meats with the substitutes. The results of the investigation together with the methods used have been published in Department Bulletin 925, Substitutes for Sucrose in Curing Meats.

During 1917 more than 17,000,000 pounds of sugar or its equivalent in syrup were used in curing meats processed in Government inspected establishments. While the wartime need for the information has passed, the results of the experiments are of economic value.

Refiners' Sugar Is Used.

The sugar substitutes for curing meats which the specialists found to be most successful are refiners' syrup and two of the three grades of corn sugar. Refiners' syrup is a dark colored, strong-flavored product resulting from the refining of cane sugar. It is produced in two grades and the production of both in 1918 was estimated by one of the large sugar refining companies to have been \$45,000,000 pounds, which is equivalent to approximately 210,000,000 pounds of sugar. It appears, says the bulletin, that the total supply of refiners' syrup is about ten times greater than the amount required to meet the sugar needs of the meat packing industry. Of the corn sugars, dextrose, a white powder, mildly sweet and readily dissolved; and cornstarch, a light brown, mildly sweet, second grade corn sugar, gave good results in curing meats.

In conducting the tests the Government specialists determined not only the quality of the products, the taste of appearance, but tested also the palatability of the cooked product. Here certain results showing the many sides of the problem. Bacon cured with the corn sugar browned more readily on frying than that cured with cane sugar or refiners' syrup. In fact in some cases the bacon cured with corn sugar had a dark and burnt appearance after frying. In other cases, however, the use of substitutes resulted in products of superior quality.

Oregon Agriculture College new swimming tank is fast nearing completion. Carpentier announced that he would present the same to his native town, Lieves, near Lens.

MADRID, Jan. 12.—An unexpected obstacle to the spread of football and other field sports in Spain has arisen in the shape of protests from pedagogues and other language purists, who are fulminating against the use of English words imported with the sport. They assert the constant shouting during the game of such exclamations as "Shoot!" "Goal!" "Pass!" and "Hurray!" in English is having the effect of spoiling the pure Spanish of the rising generation. They demand the substitution of Spanish terms for "Football," as the player usually designates himself, and for all of the other English words forced into the Spanish language by followers of the sport.

PARIS, Jan. 18.—French tennis experts predict a great court future for L. Brugnon, the 18-year-old French youth who recently won the Paris indoor tournament. Brugnon defeated A. E. Beaman, the veteran English internationalist, in the finals 6-1, 6-3, 6-0.

Young Brugnon has for a year or so been known as a first-rate amateur in Paris tennis circles, but the recent tournament was the first one in which he had ever taken part. He played a slashing, hard-driving game which practically smothered the elderly, but classy Beaman. Brugnon greatly resembles the once great Maurice McLaughlin in action.
