AUTO LICENSES MUST BE PAID

CHIEF OF POLICE FLEXER FAYORS BIG FINE.

Those Having Filed Applications Before February 1 Are in No Danger of Being Tailed Into Court.

No effort will be made to apprehend automobile license delinquents here until word has been received from Secretary of State Sam. A. Koser that all applications for licenses filed before February 1 have been acted upon by the secretary of state's office, according to Chief of Police Roy Flexer.

Chief Flexer stated this morning that a number of automobile owners have told him that they filed applications two or three weeks ago but have not received their license plates. This condition is due, he said, to congestion in the office of the secretary of state because of the flood of applications reaching the office during the past month. Under these conditions Chief Flexer believes that it would be unjust to begin prosecuting those who have not received their plates.

He stated, however, that he believes that those who failed to file their applications before February 1, the final limit set by the state officials, should be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law. "I don't believe in light fines for the men who try to get out of paying automobile license fees," he said. "Those men who have failed to take advantage of the liberality of the state officials in giving them until February 1 to procure their licenses and have not taken advantage of the opportunity to even file an application by that time should be given heavy fines. As soon as we are notified that all plates have been issued to those owners who filed their applications before the first of this month, we will begin apprehending all drivers of cars without 1931 plates."

It was announced last October that all licenses for this year must be procured by January 1. The secretary of state later announced an extension of time until January 15 and, when it was found that it was impossible to handle the work by that time, he again extended the time two weeks. No announcement has been received from him since then, but it is believed that the office is merely trying to get all licenses applied for by that time issued so that the work of enforcing the law can proceed without doing injustice to anyone.

Sheriff Lee Warnick stated that while he did not believe that those having applied for licenses should be apprehended for not having license plates attached to their cars. The congestion in the secretary of state's office, he said, is due to the applications from Multnomah county which came in in large numbers during the

last days on which application could be made.
