SCOUTS TO HAVE BIG WEEK HERE

WORK OF NATIONAL COUNCIL
TO BE SHOWN.

Re-Organization of Local Council to
Be Effected to Conform With
National Council Plan.

National Scout Week will be appropriately observed in La Grande by the local troop under the leadership of Scoutmaster A. Edward Pryke. The plans for the week call for a public demonstration Thursday, February 10, a demonstration of Scout work on Saturday, February 12 and special services at the First M. E. Church on Sunday, February 13.

At the demonstration on Thursday, the boys will put on the tenderfoot test and the second class scout test. Scoutcraft will also be appropriately illustrated during the demonstration, the aim being to give a thorough working idea of what Scoutcraft means to the boys to all who attend the demonstration.

After the demonstration on Thursday, an organization meeting will be held for the purpose of re-organizing the local council under the new plan of the national organization. This re-organization is to be effected largely so that the work of the local council will conform with the national council requirements in every detail and enable the local boys to take the second and first class work prescribed by the national council.

The re-organization plans call for at least ten men on the local council representative of the various "agencies" recognized by the national council as being eligible for the council. Among the agencies represented in La Grande are the following: ministerial association, public schools, Sunday school superintendents, city commissioners, church clubs and brotherhoods, Y. M. C. A., police force, fire department, military organization, Elks, American Legion, business and professional men.

On February 12, Lincoln's birthday, the scouts will give a demonstration in one of the downtown store windows. This demonstration will include signalling, wig-wagging, first aid work, bandaging and wireless work.

At 10:30 on Sunday morning the Scout will assemble at their headquarters in the Y. M. C. A. building and organize a parade. The line of march will be down Elm to Adams, thence to Depot street, and thence to the First M. E. Church, where the special services will be held.

The Rev. E. J. Huston will give the special talk to the boys.

Reservations will be made in the church for all members of the local council, and Mr. Pryke has requested that every member be present at the headquarters promptly at 10:30.
