FOUR L'S WILL STAGE A PLAY

The bride and groom, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Stoddard, were up from La Grande last Thursday evening to see the basketball game.

Mrs. Georgia Hull, who has been in Dallas for the last few days disposing of the property of her mother, Mrs. James Robertson, who died recently, is expected home in a day or so.

Last Thursday evening local basketball fans enjoyed one of the fastest and hardest fought games they have had the privilege of witnessing during the season, when the Lumber Jacks met a pick-up quintet from La Grande. The latter team was composed of Purdy Squad and Hall Room players. The game was played in four ten-minute quarters and at no time during the playing was either team much in the lead. The first quarter ended with Perry one point to the good, the half saw the score tied, 12-12, and the third quarter gave the pick-ups a lead of six points and, during the last quarter, each team made four points, thus piling up a final score of 20-26, in favor of the visitors. This game was only a practice encounter and does not count in the schedule of games being played at the Y. M. C. A. John Stoddard, of La Grande, acted as referee and his work was highly satisfactory to both teams.

Attendance at the local school has been much below normal for the past week owing to so many cases of colds, tonsillitis and bronchitis.

A special meeting of the Four L's was called last Wednesday, in order that Mr. Van Ness, who is canvassing the territory in this district, might have an opportunity of speaking to the local members. He was accompanied by Mr. Wolf, the field agent for this part of the Four L territory. They arrived in La Grande on Tuesday evening and planned to be here on that date but found so many Perryites at the basketball game that Mr. Van Ness waited over till Wednesday to speak here. An open meeting was held and the speaker spent the first part of the meeting in talking to the children and living things. Then he talked to the men about the conditions and prospects for the future. He made a strong appeal for everybody to hold fast to the organization till work began again. Mr. Wolf also spoke for a few minutes. Mr. Van Ness returned to Portland after meeting the La Grande and Perry locals.
