OLD LIMBER IS NOT TEMPTED

ONLY DOG WHOSE YELP EVER
HEARD IN POLITICS.

Master of the Governor, But Dog
WIN Prominently Remains at
the Old Home.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Feb. 10.—Old Limber, the only dog whose yelp was ever heard in a political campaign in Tennessee, has not been tempted from his familiar haunts in the Happy Valley vicinity by the bright lights of the capital at which his master, Gov. Alf Taylor, is presiding.

Reports that the Tennessee legislature contemplated making an appropriation for the purchase of a dog for a house for Old Limber, have led his master to announce that he will promptly veto such a proposition, and this rumored activity of political enemies is likely to result in the governor keeping Old Limber at home.

Old Limber furnished much material for Governor Taylor's speeches during his campaign. The governor always gave a graphic recital of Old Limber's prowess as a fox hunter.

"Old Limber is being cared for in a good home in East Tennessee and gets three square meals a day," is the last word from the governor on the subject. "He would not be contented in the city. He wants to be where he can occasionally survey the lofty mountains over whose heights he has many times chased the fox with the rest of the pack making music at his heels. Old Limber is nine years old, and is too old to run now, but he remembers and often dreams of his past achievements."

"If you have never heard Old Limber in full cry," the governor continues, growing more eloquent, "you have never heard music. He is gifted in every note and in a chase, at one time or another, he will let you have all of them. You could distinguish Old Limber's voice from the rest of the pack eight miles away. Honest! That dog never to me in his life. He has never been known to yelp on a cold trail. When he heard the voice of Old Limber I heard, everybody knows that there is a fox around."

The governor's East Tennessee home place boasts not only Old Limber, the most famous hound dog in Tennessee, but also a son who has taken his place as pack leader and a grandson as well.

ICE HARVEST IS UNDER WAY AT NORTH POWDER

NORTH POWDER, Feb. 10.—The large P. of E. ice pond was opened here Monday of this week and work of filling the house began, furnishing employment to a large force of men. The ice is being harvested at the thickness of about 10½ inches. The work has been delayed to some extent on account of the heavy snow which fell here Thursday. The heaviest snow of the season fell that day to the depth of about 12 inches and is now melting rapidly.

Chris Johnson Jr. opened up the ice pond belonging to his father in this place the first of the week and has also several men employed. They are shipping their ice to various places and filling the ice houses for the citizens of the town.

OLD BASEBALL FIGURE QUILTS

FRANK C. BANCROFT IS PICTURE
ESQUE FIGURE.

Says the Possibilities in the Profes-
sional Angle of Baseball Way
Back in Year 1874.

CINCINNATI, O., Feb. 10.—When Frank C. Bancroft, for 30 years business manager of the Cincinnati National league baseball club, was succeeded in that position recently by Frank Behle, an attaché of the probate court of this city, one of the most picturesque figures that baseball ever produced passed from the national pastime.

Bancroft is ill with neuritis. He has been assured by President Harry Herrmann of the club, that his salary will go on just the same. He became interested in baseball within a few years after the close of the Civil War, in which he served as a drummer boy with a New England regiment.

He saw the possibilities in a professional angle of the game in 1874 when he became identified with the New Bedford team. Later he joined the Worcester team. More than forty years of age he developed two men whose names will live forever in the annals of the game—Harry Stovey, king of base runner for all time, and Lee Richmond, perhaps the greatest left-handed pitcher of the game. In all baseball history there have been eight games pitched where no man reached first base against the winning pitcher, and in less than two years' time, Richmond pitched two of these contests.

In 1884, Bancroft managed the famous old Providence team that participated in the first world series. He piloted the team through the immortal campaign when Charles "Old Hoss" Radbourn made the pitching record that may never be equaled. "Banny's" team won the world's championship banner that year.

In 1891 Bancroft appeared in Cincinnati as manager of Mike Kelly's Players' League aggregation and he remained after "Kelly's Killers" had gone. He was engaged by the late John T. Brush, then president of the Cincinnati club, to handle the business affairs of the club. In the generation that followed Bancroft became one of the most notable baseball figures. He piloted the Reds everywhere, arranged their training tours, took them barnstorming, the fall and between times, took clubs to Cuba, Hawaii and California.

In Cuba he is known as the "Father of the ball," as it was he who took the first team of professional players to the island. He is now 76 years old.

ECHO SHEEPMEN ASK RELIEF FROM SHEEP- KILLING BY DOGS

PENDLETON, Feb. 10.—Sheepmen of Echo appeared before the county court this week with a tale of woe, declaring that dogs of that vicinity were worrying and killing their sheep. They were ordered to make affidavit of the number killed and the money will be allowed from the dog license fund.

It is understood that the sheep-killing dogs in question are not licensed and the court will seek to prosecute the owners.

GARAGE AT ADAMS BURNED TO GROUND

ADAMS, Feb. 10.—Through a fire that broke out at 10:30 yesterday morning and burned quickly and furiously, the Adams Garage with all its contents was destroyed in less than half an hour. The garage was owned by Bunch Bros., who operated it. It was full of cars at the time and, so fiercely did the flames rage, that none of the cars could be taken out.

The fire started through the ignition in some manner of a car of all near one of the cars inside the garage.

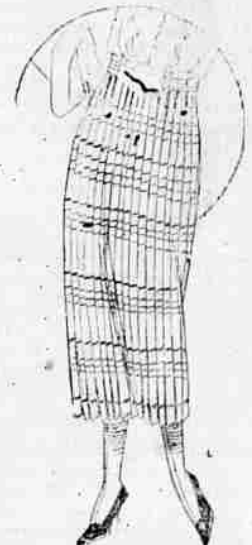
