Paying on the "Nail."

Desirable Orange.

Within thirty days two men have lost fingers as a result of accidents for which their rings were responsible, and more than twenty less serious mishaps have been reported which were due to the same cause."

The ocean is still termed by sailors "Davy Jones' Locker."

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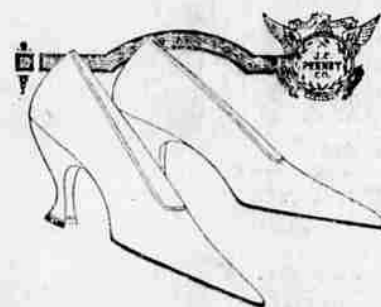


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
