**UNION TEAM
 DOWNS PURITIES**

VISITORS SWEEP LOCAL BOYS
 OFF FEET AT END.

Winners Score Total of 25 Points in
 Last Game—Purity Squad Falls
 Down in Scoring At End.

The Athletic club team of Union won from the Purity Squad of the local senior city league, at the Y. M. C. A. yesterday evening in a basketball game in which the winners did the bulk of their playing in the second half, the final score being 25 to 14. At the end of the first half the local boys had the long end, ten points having been chalked up against the visitors' six points.

The visitors were in fighting trim when the second half opened and swept the local team under, by making 19 points to the Purity's four points in that half. Brown, for the winners, made four field goals in the second half, having made none in the first half. Geertsen, captain of the visitors' team, made one field goal in the first half and two field and one foul goal in the second, while Goodman made two field and one foul, Spencer, Taylor and Compton one foul goal during the game.

For the local team, Taylor and Lyman made one each each, and Wright, Geddes and Webb made one each. No goals were made on fouls by the Purity Squad.

The lineup of the teams follows: Union, Goodman and Geertsen, forwards; Brown, center; Spencer and Compton, guards; Hess, Callahan and Serrina, substitutes. Purity Squad, Wright, Taylor and Webb, forwards; Lyman, center; Geddes and Ash, guards.

**SUPREME COURT
 DATE IS SET**

WILL MEET IN PENDLETON ON
 MAY SECOND.

Appeal of John L. Rathie and Elvie D. Kerby Will Most Likely Be Heard at May Term.

PENDLETON, Feb. 17.—Oregon's supreme court will hold its next semi-annual session for Eastern Oregon in the county court house at Pendleton beginning Monday, May 2. Major Lee Moorehouse, clerk of the court for this district, has announced. From present indications there will be a busy term for the court.

The appeal of John L. Rathie and Elvie D. Kerby, under sentence for first degree murder, will most likely be heard at the May term here. There was filed on Friday afternoon a stipulation between R. I. Keator, district attorney, and Charles L. Bolin, attorney for the appellants, that the opening brief of the latter may be filed by March 1. By the time the state has filed its brief and the appellants their reply brief, it will be nearly May 1, the clerk believes.

Papers citing defendants in the cases to appear within 10 days in circuit court to present their claims, have been filed with the county clerk. The cases cannot come to trial before Monday, February 24, Mr. Keator said yesterday. If all goes well, the county hopes to have its share of the reward money for the capture of Rathie, Kerby and Emmett Bancroft paid up by the end of this month.

Mr. Bolin, who is here on legal business, says he intends to present at the hearing on appeal, dying statements from Emmett Bancroft, hanged at Salem November 5, for his part in the murder of Sheriff T. H. Taylor. These, the attorney says, are in contradiction to some of the testimony given by the convicted man on the stand here. Mr. Bolin expresses belief that the decision of the lower court in the conviction of Kerby and Rathie will be reversed by the supreme court.

**DEEP SNOWS WRECK
 CHURCH AT CORNUCOPIA**

HALFWAY, Feb. 17.—The Catholic church at Cornucopia, a mining camp twelve miles from Halfway, was destroyed Sunday by the weight of snow upon it. The steeple fell first, crashing through the roof and wrecking the building. Only the entrance and the windows remain undamaged. The snow is eight feet at Cornucopia and fifteen feet deep in the mountains near there.

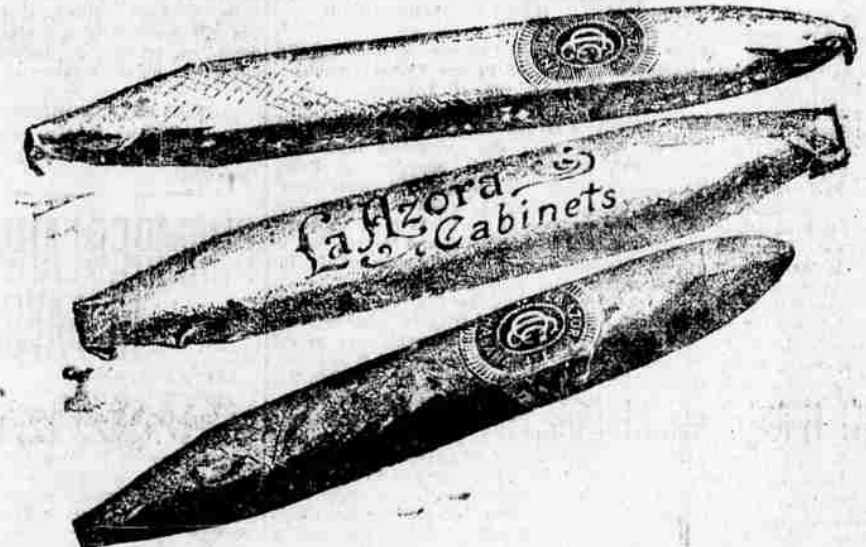
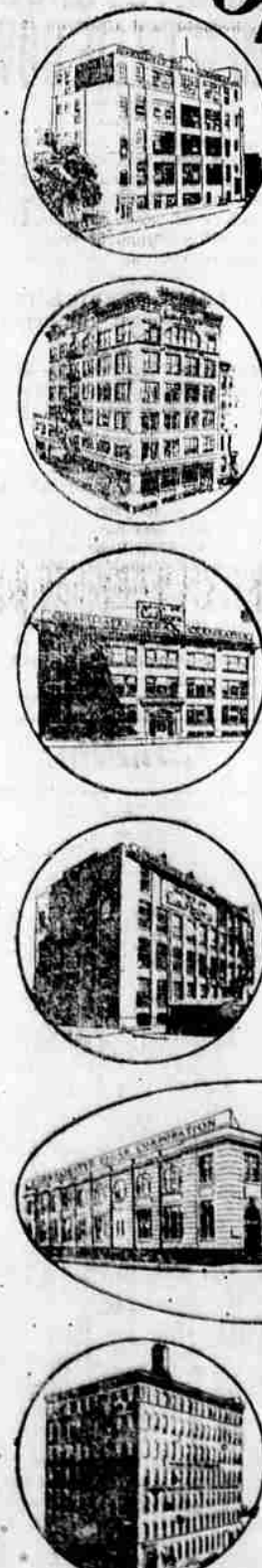
