TUNBRIDGE WELLS, Eng., Jan.
28.—(By Correspondence.)—Reputed

cycle ever used in England, the Rev.

81, at Pembury, a village near here.
While working as a coach-builder in
Oxfordshire he is said to have con-
structed a two-wheeled machine on
which he rode through the main street
