AD CLUB HAS BUSY MEETING

FAILURE OF SINGERS TO ARRIVE IS DISAPPOINTMENT.

Housing Problem, Especially Regarding Teachers, Among Subjects Discussed at Meeting Today

Members of the Ad Club were badly disappointed this noon in not being able to hear the Garner Jubilee singers at their weekly luncheon. The jubilee singers, who are scheduled to appear at the Star theatre here this evening, could not get to La Grande this morning as the roads are in such a shape that making the trip in an automobile was out of the question.

G. I. Larson brought the subject of bankruptcy before the members of the club. He called attention to the disregard for debt that has grown so greatly during the past year and stigmatized resort to bankruptcy as a disgrace. Criticism by society of the man who gets the best of his creditors will do much, in Mr. Larson's opinion, to build up a greater regard for business ethics. It was agreed by the members present that the matter should be referred to the publicity committee.

Teachers Need Apartments. The housing question was the subject of extended discussion, especially regarding the tentative plans for an apartment house here. A. C. Hampton, superintendent of schools, pointed out the necessity for providing better housing conditions for teachers.

"The housing of teachers here is a very serious problem," Mr. Hampton said. "Teachers' living quarters in La Grande are not at all satisfactory. A change should be brought about because they will be happier and more contented if housed in small apartments."

Mr. Hampton also discussed similar apartments in Pendleton where an \$85,000 apartment building was recently erected. There are 26 three-room apartments in the building, renting for from \$45 to \$87.50 per month. According to the owners of these apartments, the investment, when all apartments are constantly rented, will be from 10 to 15 per cent, although the building is new and no exact estimate can be made. The building is owned by ten Pendleton business men.

Mr. Hampton pointed out that there are 62 teachers in the schools, many of whom are clamoring for better living quarters.

Post House Report. H. E. Coolidge, chairman of the post house committee reported to the club. He stated that his committee had met with both the city and county officials and that all expressed a desire to join and build a post house which would handle a situation similar to the one confronting La Grande this winter.

Endorse Aircraft Company. Walter Lees, of the La Grande Aircraft company, asked the endorsement of the club for his company. He explained that he expected to solicit business in all parts of eastern Oregon and that the club's endorsement would do much to eliminate antagonism that might be caused because of the company's mismanagement last year. The members voted unanimously to grant his wish.

At present the company has two planes paid for and Mr. Lees expects his mechanic in a few days, when the machines will be put into first class condition.

Nominating Committee. A nominating committee to nominate candidates for the chairmanships of the 25 committees was appointed by President H. E. O'Brien. The committee will report at the next meeting, which will begin the club's new year. Members of the committee are A. W. Nelson, Wm. Miller, H. E. Coolidge, Floyd McKennon and Chas. Reynolds.
