Now that state has copied some of our laws and has sent a large number of her young men and women to our agricultural colleges. The development of transportation was touched upon. A great many of us remember how proud we felt when father brought home a hack and mother would say, 'Now children, don't act foolish. Mrs. Orland Anson said: "There is one thing that hasn't changed in this valley. When we came here from Nebraska several years ago, the first thing we noticed was the absence of wind mills and we thought, of course, there wasn't enough wind to run them."

The members of the Grange are busy preparing a program that will be put on at the basket social that will be given at the hall Saturday evening, February 26. The proceeds will go on the piano fund. Everybody welcome.
