FATHER AND SON BANQUET

BOYS AND THEIR FATHERS TO FEAST TODAY AT Y. M. C. A.

Rev. C. A. Rexroad, the Fighting Parson, Will Tell of Boys and Daddies He Has Known.

Rev. C. A. Rexroad, popularly known as "the fighting parson," who is the chief speaker at the Father and Son Banquet this evening, arrived here on the morning train, having come from Butte by way of Pocatello. Rev. Rexroad is pastor of the United Methodist church at Milton, Oregon, physical director in the union high school there and holds the chair of physics in the Columbia junior college while between times he places his services at the disposal of the Y. M. C. A. He made a Father and Son address at Butte, and from there came here to fill a similar engagement, going to Milton this evening to look after his regular work for a while.

As the subject of his address he has chosen, "Some Boys I Have Known and Their Daddies." He will bring out many of his experiences in Europe during the war. While serving as chaplain in the American forces he was promoted to a captaincy for conduct under fire, a rank obtainable by a chaplain only by meritorious conduct under fire or by seven years' service as first lieutenant. War medals and citations Rev. Rexroad has in large number, including the Belgian Croix de Guerre and a personal citation from General Pershing.

Short Is Toastmaster. The toastmaster of the evening will be C. E. Short. Rev. E. J. Huston, of the First Methodist church, will pronounce the invocation. Following this the dinner will occupy the attention of the boys and their daddies for a time, after which the program will be continued. A violin solo will be rendered by Floyd Smith, Rev. J. A. Smith will speak on "My Boy and I" following the solo and he will be followed by a vocal solo by Sherwood Williams.

The closing address will be by Rev. Rexroad. While reservations have been made in large number during the past few days, there were still several chances late this afternoon for fathers and sons to attend and any wishing to attend may make reservations by notifying J. C. Cramer at the Y. M. C. A. immediately. The attendance is expected at least to equal that at last year's banquet when over 135 fathers and sons attended. The banquet starts at 6:30 sharp.

essary, but whose number and compensation shall be determined and fixed by the county court.

7. (9) County school superintendent, (\$1,650) \$1,800. The county school superintendent shall receive and be reimbursed for all actual and necessary traveling expenses, the annual amount thereof to be fixed by the county court of Union county, at the time of advertising budget.

8. (10) That the sheriff(s) of Union (and Wallowa counties) county, in the state of Oregon, shall (each) be allowed and paid, in addition to the salary provided by law, the actual expenses of himself and his deputies incurred in the service of all process, both civil and criminal, (within their respective counties, not to exceed the sum of six hundred dollars (\$600) in any one year; the same to be audited and allowed by the county court(s) of their respective counties).

Section 2. All such officers shall receive no other compensation what ever for their services and all fees collected by them under existing laws shall be turned into the county treasury, as provided by law.

Section 3. This act shall become effective July 1, 1921.

Amendments to House Bill No. 322.

1. Amend the title of the bill by striking out the period after the word "Oregon" in line 2, page 1 of the printed bill; insert a comma and add the following words: "and to provide for submitting this amendatory act to the electors of Union County, Oregon".

2. Amend section three of the bill so as to read as follows: "Section 3. This act shall become effective July 1, 1921; provided, however, that this amendatory act shall be referred to the electors of Union County in the State of Oregon for their ratification or rejection at the next general election to be held in 1922; provided, further, that if a special election is called prior to that date, this measure shall be submitted to the electors of said county at such special election and shall be in full force and effect upon its ratification by the electors of Union County, State of Oregon".

House Bill No. 288, introduced by Mr. Hyatt and read for the first time January 31, relating to the salaries of the officers of Wallowa county, reads as follows:

For an act to amend section of 3628, of Oregon Laws, relating to salaries of the officers of Wallowa county.

Be it Enacted By the People of the State of Oregon:

Section 1. That section 3628 of Oregon Laws be, and the same is hereby, amended so as to read as follows:

Sec. 3628. The county officers of Wallowa county shall receive as compensation for their services the following annual salaries:

(1) County judge, \$1,200.

(2) County commissioner, \$5 per day for each day employed in the

- (3) County treasurer, (\$1,000) \$1,200.
- (4) County clerk, \$1,800.
- Sheriff, (\$2,100) \$2,200.
- (6) Assessor, (\$1,500) \$2,000. (a) The county assessor shall appoint such deputies as may be necessary, but whose number and compensation shall be determined and fixed by the county court of Wallowa county.)
- (7) County school superintendent, (\$1,500) \$1,800.
- (8) The county officers shall appoint their own deputies. The number of salary of said deputies shall be fixed and determined by the county court of said county. (The said county court shall also fix and determine the traveling expenses of said officers and their deputies.) Said county court shall also allow and pay to said officers as traveling expenses the sum of 10 cents per mile for each mile necessarily traveled by said officers in attending to the duties of their offices outside of the city of Enterprise, and such further additional traveling expense not to exceed one thousand dollars per annum for the sheriff and not to exceed three hundred dollars per annum for the county school superintendent. No other sum or sums whatever shall be allowed to said officers, nor to any one or more of said officers for traveling expenses, and no sum or sums whatever shall be allowed for traveling expenses to the deputies of said officers, nor to the deputy or deputies of any one or more of said officers.
