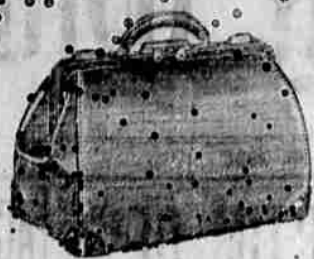
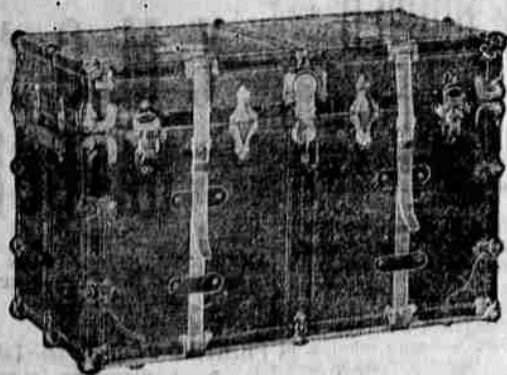

### GRAZING CHANGE TO BE MADE BY OFFICIALS IN 1923

Changes of considerable importance will be made within the next two years in the apportionment of U. S. forest range land. The basis of apportionment will be according to accessibility, water, location, and other factors having an influence on its desirability for such purposes.

Parent supervisors recently met in Portland to discuss the proposed changes. All forests of the federal government will be affected.

According to statements made by J. C. Kuhns, supervisor stationed at Pendleton, fire fighting and fire prevention were other topics discussed at the meeting in Portland. Improvements in the patrol system of eastern Oregon forests were discussed at the meeting. The extent of these improvements is dependent on the action of congress regarding appropriations for the work, according to F. W. Kendall, local ranger. Mr. Kendall expects to know within a week the extent of improvements in the forest adjacent to La Grande.

## NEW PRESIDENT IS APPOINTED

RICHARD F. SCHOLTZ WILL HEAD REED COLLEGE

For the Past Year Scholtz Has Held a Professorship at the University of Washington.

PORTLAND, Feb. 25.—Richard F. Scholtz, professor of history at the University of Washington, has been announced president of Reed college to succeed William T. Foster, who resigned the presidency in December, 1919. The college administration for the past year has been in the hands of Professors A. A. Knowlton and F. L. Griffin. Dr. Scholtz will assume his new post early in April.

Dr. Scholtz has a notable record of scholastic achievement. He received his bachelor's, master's and doctor's degrees from the University of Wisconsin, and, according to Who's Who, was selected as the first Rhodes scholar from Wisconsin in 1904. For three years he studied abroad, returning to begin a series of teaching positions that included lecturing professorships at Wisconsin, Harvard, the universities of California and Washington. He has been professor of history at Washington since September, 1918, and last year was editor of the Pacific Review, a national quarterly published by the University extension department.

Dr. Scholtz has been introduced to Portland as a man of unusual ability, pleasing personality, and the substantial qualities necessary to success in educational positions of an executive nature. Dr. Scholtz is 40 years old. With his wife and three children he will take up his residence on the Reed campus late in March.

brought the 91st back to this country. Rev. Rexroad had an opportunity of being constantly in touch with the saddest part of army life—telling the fathers and mothers of the last days of their beloved boys. There he observed a pride in the heroic deaths of sons that can probably be understood to the full only by those who made such unbearable sacrifices as having their children slain in battle.

### Father Love Universal.

The love of father and son is found wherever man is found, Rev. Rexroad said in his closing remarks. But on continental Europe fathers and sons show their love for each other the same as in the United States here. The American father's love for his son is as great, but to him it is manly to show no visible signs of emotion at such sad moments as were forced on all homes during the war when the sons left for the front, no matter how big the lump in his throat nor how his heart cried out for more visible signs of tenderness.

"Comradeship and inspiration from the father to the son should be brought more to the front," Rev. Rexroad declared. "When the father and his son meet on common ground and the dad does not always want to play the man before the boy, the boy will be immeasurably benefited as well as the dad."

### Rev. Smith Speaks.

Rev. J. A. Smith chose as his subject "The Boy and I" and told of his own experiences with his boys. "There is nothing that can quite compare with the feeling the father experiences in being a pal with his boys," he said. "To cultivate a feeling of companionship between father and son is one of the most important duties and when more fathers realize this they will become much better acquainted with their own sons in the evenings and want to spend more evenings at home."

### Boy Tells His Ideas.

"The kind of a father the boy likes" was the subject of Orville Divens, who spoke as a representative of the boys. He struck a warm spot of every boy hearing him when he told how he likes to go camping, hunting, hiking and play with his dad in many other ways. In his school work, too, the father that the boy likes is a guide and makes difficult problems clear to him.

J. L. Cramer explained the Christian citizenship program recently inaugurated by the local Y. M. C. A. La Grande is one of probably a dozen cities in the United States in which the Y. M. C. A. organization has adopted this new system which makes it possible for every boy to become a member of the Y. M. C. A., making the membership a matter of service rather than basing it on a fee system. By placing himself under competent Christian leadership the boys place themselves in the same position regarding financial support that their elders are in by giving them the privilege of voluntary donations from money earned themselves.

J. A. Edwin Pryke, physical director of the Y. M. C. A., explained the system of development for boys in detail. A number of impromptu speeches were made. Those called on for these remarks were: A. C. Hampton, superintendent of schools; H. E. Coolidge, Revs. Jos. W. Gunn, E. J. Huston, R. H. Colker.

C. E. Short acted as toastmaster. In his opening remarks he called attention to the purpose of the banquet, which was similar to those held on the same evening in every city of importance in the United States.
