Coker also has under consideration the taking of the pastorate of the Pacific Avenue Christian church of Spokane, but as yet is undecided regarding either position.

**Engineer Gives Figures**—In the annual report of Percy Cupper, state engineer, received here today, much data on irrigation in Oregon is given and also reference is made to undeveloped water power in Oregon. The delay in the development of power is commented upon and the estimate made that in Oregon alone there is between three million and four million potential hydro-electric power with less than 200,000 horse power developed all told. The hope is expressed that under the new federal water power act better results may be obtained.

**Return From Salem**—Senator Colon R. Eberhard, and Senator Bruce Dennis were among this morning's train arrivals, having spent the past several weeks in legislative work at Salem. In speaking of the session just closed, Senator Eberhard said that it was much as the Journal had stated, "that the legislature had done nothing bad." ### FOREST RANGERS WILL GATHER IN BAKER IN APRIL

BAKER, Feb. 25.—Some time in the first ten days of April, the date to be selected yet, there will be a joint meeting of forest rangers and workers in Baker. There will be from 40

to 50 people in attendance at the meetings, including rangers and supervisors and men from the Portland forest office. They will be from Walla Walla, Umatilla, Wenaha, Malheur and Whitman forests. At these meetings all work of the forest pertaining to fire control, grazing and the routine work will be discussed.

## G. A. R. MEETING IS CHANGED

PENDLETON, Feb. 25.—The Grand Army state encampment, scheduled to be held here June 8, 9 and 10, will be held June 14, 15 and 16, as the first dates conflict with the Portland Rose Festival. Word to this effect was received today by S. P. Hutchinson, commander of the Carson Post, from C. A. Williams, assistant adjutant general for the G. A. R. Eight hundred or 1000 G. A. R. men are expected to be here for the convention. There are 12 G. A. R. men registered in the local post and Mr. Hutchinson asks that they meet with him Saturday at 2:30 p. m. in the city hall to make plans for the meeting here. The encampment was held here once before in former years, when Assessor Brannin was commander of the post.

## ICE PLANT LOSS IS TOTALLED

PENDLETON, Feb. 25.—Final adjustment of fire insurance and losses on the Smythe-Lomeran cold storage plant, and the creamery has not yet been made but it has been announced that the actual loss of the Smythe-Lomeran Co., is about \$30,000 and the Golden West creamery about \$10,500. Most of this is covered by insurance, stated the adjusters. Total estimated loss on the whole fire with the exception of the outside stock stored, is now set at \$45,000. Cause of the fire is now laid to defective wiring and the intermittent power service of that night.

## HAWAII MAY BE QUARANTINED

U. S. WOULD KEEP ISLAND FREE OF INSECT PESTS.

Sugar Cane, Corn, Cotton and Alfalfa Are Articles to Be Considered in Quarantine.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—To protect Hawaii against certain insect pests which are damaging crops in the United States, the Department of Agriculture today announced the calling of a hearing to be held in Room 41, Federal Horticultural Board, April 15, at 10 o'clock, a. m., to consider a quarantine against the carrying of sugar cane, corn, cotton, and alfalfa plants or parts thereof, and the fruits of avocado and papaya by passengers or in ships' stores from this country to the territory.

The Secretary of Agriculture has information of existing danger that injurious insects, including the sugar cane and corn-moth borer, the avocado weevil, the papaya fruit fly, the alfalfa weevil, and the cotton boll weevil occurring in the United States, may be introduced into Hawaii through plants or parts of plants and fruits carried by passengers or as ships' stores.
