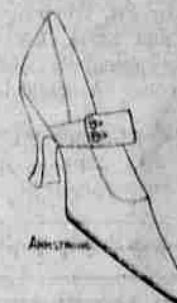

advantages that might be gained in making them the distributing base of manufactured articles for Japan, China, Borneo, Sumatra, Java and India. Touching on its physical geography and climate, the population was classified in its several groups.

The aborigines of the islands, Negritos, and the Moros, or Mohammedan Malays of Mindanao, and the Sulu Archipelago, elicited peculiar interest. The Catholic population, estimated at 95 per cent of all the inhabitants, for centuries is largely administered by the Jesuit and Augustinian friars.

The history and progress of education was treated from the ancient Convent School, Santa Imbel, 1594, and the University, San Tomas, Manila, established at the time the Pilgrim Fathers landed on our shores, both still flourishing institutions, to the extensive school program of today, which conveys the opportunity to all to share in the wonderful achievements and progress of our educational facilities. Various photos of ancient educational works, of groups of native teachers and Filipino women who have excelled in the higher professions, were placed on the screen at this juncture.

The great strides of progress wrought by our government regarding sanitation, roads, and bridges, was indicated with numerous slides. Special reference was made to the new Hotel of Manila, the cleaning

of the protective canals skirting the walls of the city of Manila, the boulevards, miles of highway and numerous substantial and artistic bridges. The Philippine administration was classified in its departments and the photos of the native and able governing bodies were slides, and concluding the lecture, the flag that symbolizes true benevolence for our islands and stands foremost in successful colonization work.
