RETAILERS WILL
ABSORB RAISE

PENDLETON, Mar. 3.—Retailers of gasoline in Pendleton are practically unanimous in their decision to absorb the extra cent per gallon added to the price by the Standard Oil Co. in this state to care for the state road tax of one cent placed on gasoline by the legislature. The new wholesale price was raised yesterday and by last night most dealers had individually decided to keep the price at 38 cents per gallon instead of the pump stations.

This decision leaves little profit in handling the gas and the services will be given more in the nature of an accommodation to patrons of garages and service stations. The wholesale price is between 34 and 35 cents in the city.

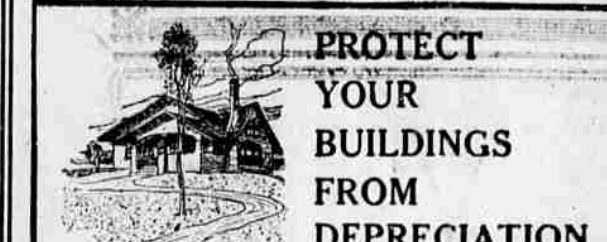
