

ANTI-SOVIET RISING IS CONFIRMED

SOVIET GOVERNMENT HAS NOT
LOST CONTROL.

Petrograd and Moscow Are the Centers Around Which the Fighting Is Taking Place.

LONDON, Mar. 2.—The official British representatives confirm the dispatches telling of the anti-soviet uprising in Russia. The situation is declared to be serious. The latest news does not, however, indicate that the soviet government has lost control. The reports tell of the fighting in many parts of Russia with Petrograd and Moscow the centers of the revolutionary movement. In Petrograd, 300,000 strikers are arrayed against the soviet troops.

done on those streets where there are few vacant lots. The owners of the vacant lots are, in many cases non-residents and it will probably be unfeasible to interest these in the work so as to make them willing to pay cash for the work.

Much Work Can Be Done. A considerable amount of work can be done this year under this plan, the commissioners believe, and it is entirely up to the residents whether they want the work done or not. On a motion by Commissioner J. D. McKennon, the city manager was instructed to advise property owners who have requested street work of the intention of the commissioners to work out a plan along the lines mentioned if proper petitions are presented.

Labor Is Cheaper. During the discussion it was brought out that this work can be done much cheaper this year than last year. Gravel can be hauled for \$1 a yard now instead of \$2 a yard, the prevailing price for that sort of work a year ago, it was stated. Teams are plentiful at \$6 per day and, because gasoline and the upkeep of tractors is so high the old fashioned horse labor is much more feasible for this work now than in other years.

the distribution among the various phases of the work being as follows: water department, \$149.91; street department, \$285.72; sewer work, \$44.52.

Library Popular. Miss Mary A. Nichols, librarian,

rendered a report covering the months of January and February. According to this report the interest in the library is increasing, the number of volumes loaned daily having appreciably increased.

During the month of January, a daily average of 122 volumes were loaned by the library, the total during the month being 3664 volumes. During the month of February the number of volumes loaned daily increased to 133, a total of 3190 being loaned during the month. There is a gain over the same period of last year of 1013 volumes.

The number of borrowers increased

by 268 during these two months and 325 new books were added to the shelves.

Unemployed Lead.

Miss Nichols points out that a part of the increase in use of the facilities is probably due to the number of unemployed men in the city at this time. The work of the library staff has increased so through its increasing popularity that efforts have been made recently to obtain another trained librarian, the report states, but the scarcity of librarians with the proper training is so acute that so far none has been obtained.
