THE STORAGE BATTERY

Of all parts of the car, the storage battery is the most ill-used and abused. Abuse occurs mostly when using the starting motor.

The starting motor, because of its large windings and great power needed, takes a large amount of electric current, which is taken from the storage battery. It varies from 150 to 450 amperes and one starting of the car normally takes from 20 minutes to 1 hour to charge and put the battery into normal shape. When a car starts hard, the battery runs down in a short time and it needs to be taken to a battery station to be recharged. It is sometimes a question to the car owner when his battery ought or ought not to be recharged and therein lies the source of battery neglect.

I have heard some car owners say, "My battery will not start the car, yet it gives good lights, why is this?" In nine cases out of ten, the battery was partially run down and the starter used when the battery should have been recharged.

The automobile generator partially recharged the battery when running, but never fully charged the plates, and although the battery never sulphated, the positive plates became hard and the plates lost their porous condition and consequently had a low discharge rate—not enough to turn the motor over.

This condition leaves the battery practically worthless. A battery will sulphate when standing idle and, if attended to at least once a month, will result in destroying the plates.

Sulphation is caused by action of the sulphuric acid on both plates, forming a white scum on the plates, which in time becomes hard as glass and makes the plates worthless.

When taken in time, sulphation may be cured by a long, slow charge at a battery station.

After using the battery about one year or more the separators are becoming acid-etched and need replacing.

This condition is indicated when the battery will take a charge but will not keep it for any length of time and sometimes it will not take a charge at all. Then a battery expert is needed to repair same.

Sediment below the plates will show the same symptoms.

An over-charged battery shows, when taken apart, often perforated separators and also the active material has fallen from the grid.

Over-charge will show the same things, also buckled plates will result and consequent short-circuit of the battery.

Heating of battery indicates too high charge, lack of acid, sediment in bottom of jars, perforated separators or sulphation, also hardened active material.
