ADAMS AVENUE FIRST TO HAVE WINTER'S COAT REMOVED. Street Grading Program of Spring Started This Morning—Victory Way to Benefit.

The city road grader this morning started its spring work. At ten o'clock the mud and dirt that has accumulated on Adams avenue between Third street and the city limits was all scraped off and the machine was transferred to Cedar street.

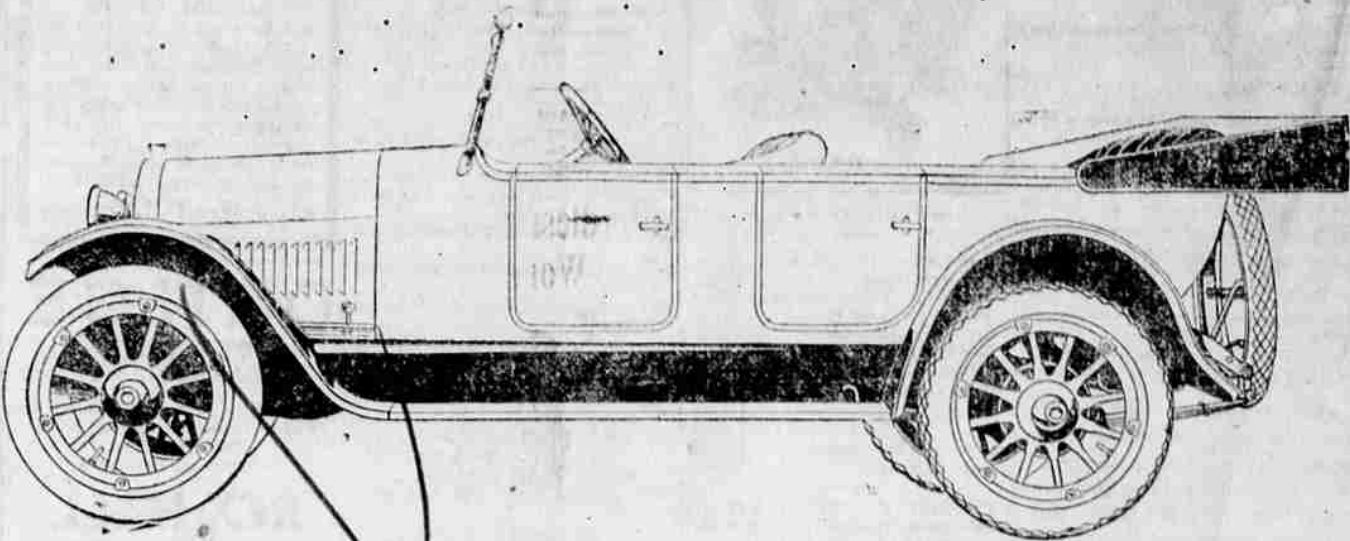
The work on the unpaved and unmacadamized streets will be rushed as fast as possible so that the streets will be ready for gravel, which is to be put on at the expense of the property owners, whenever they agree to meet that expense.

The dirt being removed from Adams avenue is being hauled to Spruce street, the future Victory Way, and used to fill up the ditch on the north side of the roadway. That removed from other streets will probably be used for this purpose, at least, until such time as the low places there are all filled up.
