IMPOSITION EXPLAINED

MANY AGENCIES INTERESTED IN
CASE OF ALLEGED DISTRESS.

How the people of La Grande co-operate with the social service organizations when cases of distress are found was shown this winter by an unfortunate case in which a family, coming here early in winter from Central Oregon in a "prairie schooner," has taken every possible advantage of the good will of residents here.

A husband and wife, the former apparently a strong husky man, and four years of age, have been living four years of age, have been living off the charity of local residents for several months. The wife and mother is a semi-invalid and the husband, a husky looking man, refuses to work because he alleges that he has a weak back. Once a job was offered him and he refused, and when medical attention and an examination were offered he also refused, but continued "working" all the charitable organizations for all he could get out of them. At the headquarters of one of the organizations that has been interested in the case and receives almost daily requests from kind hearted people asking that this "family in terrible distress" be given aid, it was stated that last week several good hearted citizens were out canvassing some of the business houses to secure aid for this terrible case of "poverty."

All Aid Family.

Several days ago the various social service agencies in the city who have been especially active in aiding this family held an informal conference and discussed this case. While the name of the family is being withheld, Mrs. Fay Catlin, secretary of the local chapter of the Red Cross, has issued the following statement, setting forth the work done by this case in the various agencies:

"A very informal conference has been held by the social workers of the staffs of the Salvation Army and the American Red Cross, with the county nurse. The particular problem under discussion was that of a family in which all these organizations and probably others have been interested, and each has borne its share of responsibility. In accordance with the ethics of social work, each organization has respected the confidential relationship held toward the family and there has been for this reason a lack of understanding by members of the community in general, that the needs of the family were being adequately met.

County Gives Aid.

"It is repeatedly reported to the various relief organizations in La Grande that the family is destitute and receiving no care. The county nurse has had the health problem in her care and has adequately met the need. Both the Salvation Army and the Red Cross have made necessary contributions of a constructive nature and all three organizations feel that the kindness and generosity of many members of the community are being imposed upon by the appeals of the family for indiscriminate help.

"A very careful investigation of the real needs has been made and it is felt that the greatest kindness that could be shown would be to assist the family to maintain itself and then to compel them to do so. It is because of the continuous appeals and complaints made to the various organizations of the city that they feel a fair explanation is due to the public."
