

LA GRANDE IS REPRESENTED

LOCAL STUDENTS TAKE AGRICULTURAL COURSE AT O. A. C.

Graduates of La Grande High School decide to stick to the soil for their future life work.

La Grande has six students taking an agricultural course of study at the Oregon Agricultural College. All the classes have a representative from La Grande. The enrollment of the school of agriculture is 882 of the 3525 students enrolled in the various schools and departments of the college. Two hundred and one of the 882 are federal rehabilitation men. The enrollment of these federal rehabilitation men has increased from 161 the first quarter to 201 the second quarter.

The senior class in agriculture is 1908 at the time the department of agriculture was organized in a school of agriculture numbered only 8. The present senior class numbers more than 100 students and is almost a fourth larger than the 1920 class. The enrollment of the school is eleven times that of the school year of 1907-08.

ROD AND GUN CLUB ORGANIZED

BAKER, Mar. 8.—A new organization of sportsmen has been started in Baker county when about fifty enthusiastic hunters and fishermen gathered at the club rooms of the Chamber of Commerce and formed the Baker County Rod and Gun Club. The purpose of the club is to organize sportsmen throughout the county into an enthusiastic body and through concerted action attempt to get a better share of the fish fry and game that is distributed by the state.

When under way the club activities will not be confined to hunting and fishing. There will also be trap and rifle shooting, and casting tournaments. A rifle range is already under consideration.

CRUISE LAYNG CREEK TIMBER

PRESENT METHOD OF CRUISING IS MOST INTERESTING.

Government Plan Cuts Off Timbered Area by Sections, Allowing 100 Years for Timber to Grow

ROSEBURG, Mar. 8.—Forest Supervisor W. E. Ramsdell has been notified that the government has authorized a cruise of the timber of the Layng creek basin. There are 17,000 acres that have never been accurately cruised and a special field party is to be sent out from Portland to do this work. The Layng creek basin lies in the extreme northern part of the Umpqua national forest and is near the Diston section where the government timber sale goes on yearly. The new cruise will enable the forest service to determine accurately the number of million feet of timber that can be cut annually from the Layng creek district.

The forest service has a very interesting method of disposing of its timber. A tract is surveyed and the timber cruised accurately. The tract

is then divided into small sections and each year a certain amount of timber is removed. The sale is conducted that at the end of 100 years the cutters can return to the first tract and start work again. It has been proven by tests that Douglas county fir in 100 years attains almost its full growth. In some places where only a smaller class of timber is desired, rotation is possible in 50 or 60 years.

This plan has been in operation at Rujada, in the Umpqua national forest, for a number of years, the government having established the experiment there as one of the first of its kind in the country. The plan has been found so successful that practically all of the timber in the northwest is to be marketed in this manner. It insures continuous and permanent operation of the mills in each locality and provides against a complete exhaustion of the timber of the country.

When a section is cut off the slashings are burned within a year after being cut. It has been the practice to leave a few large seed trees standing, but experiment has shown that this is not necessary, as there are sufficient seeds in the ground to insure a new growth.
