REDUCED FARES TO SESSIONS

PORTLAND, Mar. 8.—All railroad lines in the territory embraced have granted a special fare of one and one-half for the round trip to all delegates to the third annual international mining convention to be held here April 5 to 9. The territory in question is British Columbia, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Washington and Utah.

Round trip tickets at the special rate will be on sale from April 5 to 9, inclusive, and will extend the return privilege up to and including April 30.

Validation of the tickets for the return will have to be obtained from the Portland agent through means of identification certificates.

FARMERS WILL GREET PRICE

week and then gave up the fight. Somebody shipped a car of grain out recently and this, it was stated today, is partly responsible for the bad condition of the roadbed.

A. W. Nelson also took up the fight in behalf of the people at Cove. He suggested that the transportation committee get after the operators of the "railroad" into that section and see if something can't be done to make the matter better.

Weatherproofing Cheap.
Elmer Stoddard brought out the fact that graveling the roads makes them weather proof and is also a mighty economical means of making twelve-month roads out of three-month roads. He has made a daily trip to Perry for three years, now, and, although the riding is sometimes a bit rough, has always been able to make his trips.

Recently 200 yards of road near Perry was gravelled at a cost of \$101, the teams being furnished by Mr. Stoddard's company. This work gave an 8-foot strip and even at a cost of \$100 a hundred yards, when cost of teams is included, which would be the maximum, the county can do some good weather-proofing of roads at a cost mighty reasonable.

G. L. Larson pointed out that the business men of the city are in such a position now that they cannot extend sufficient credit to the men out of work to carry the latter through an extended period of idleness. Judge J. W. Knowles also wholeheartedly endorsed the proposal to give Union county men work on public improvement.

All Home Labor.
If the city and county undertake the proposed program, the men to be employed will all be Union county men—those who are up against it now because of the lack of jobs.

Lodges Favor.

The opinion prevailed that a slight depreciation of warrants is better than to allow these families to suffer because of the inability of the head of the families to obtain employment at this time.

Committees were appointed by both lodges to call on the city and county commissioners at their next meetings. The committees will call on the city commissioners at the meeting Wednesday evening.
