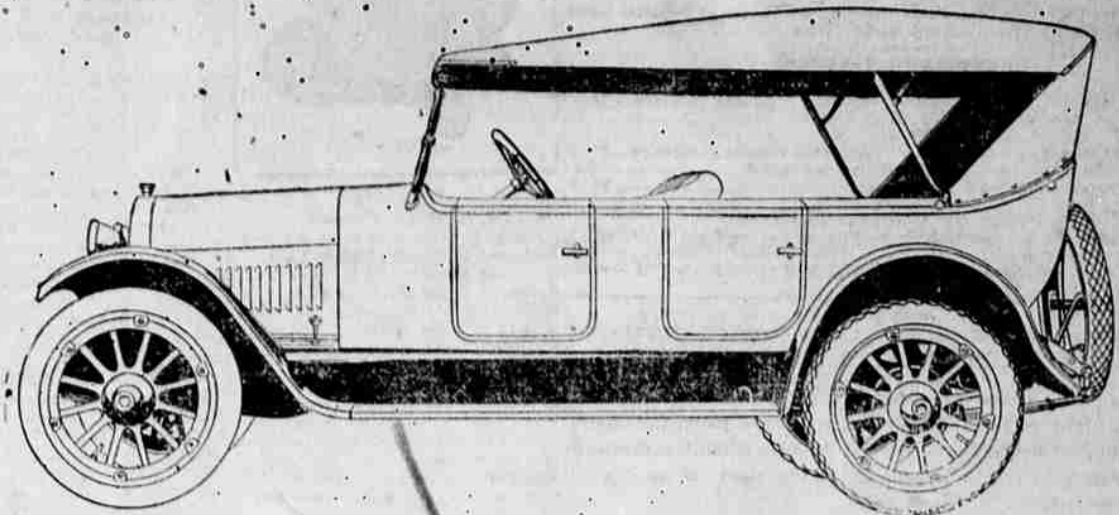
Ed. Wright Back—

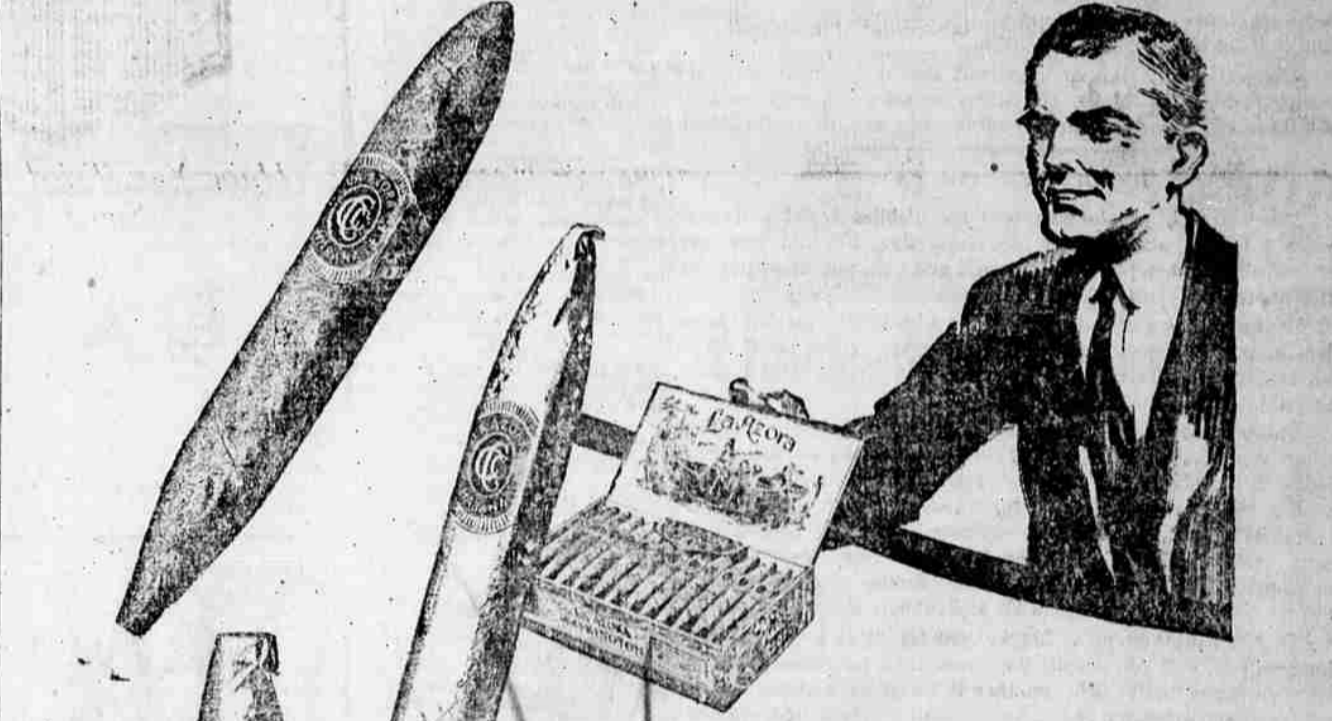
