HERE IS CHANCE TO GET BUFFALO

WASHINGTON, Mar. 10.—Does anybody want a bull buffalo? If so speak up, for Uncle Sam has twenty of assorted sizes and including a teeny one year calf, to give away.

"Here," says the Forest Service announcement, "is an excellent opportunity to get a real-live buffalo—not as gentle, perhaps, as a kitten, but, nevertheless, a nice pet, if you have plenty of room to keep him, surrounded by a 12-floor double-ply, woven-wire fence, and the price of two tons of hay a year."

The buffalo are the surplus of the flourishing herd in Wichita national forest, started 15 years ago with 15 head, but now numbering 150. There are too many bulls for domestic tranquility in the herd and you can have one free by paying the cost of crating and hauling.

RAILROAD MEN ARE WARNED

FAKE REPRESENTATIVES ARE EXPECTED HERE.

E. J. Elbury, of San Francisco, Asks That Local Merchants and Railway Men Be Warned.

J. E. Enberg, president of the local Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, is in receipt of a telegram from E. J. Elbury, of San Francisco, and J. J. editors of the Western Railway Journal, advising the local organization and merchants that persons who claim to be editor of this Journal are on their way to La Grande, to try to get advertising from local merchants and for the brotherhood.

The telegram reads as follows: "San Francisco, Mar. 8.—J. E. Enberg, 2003 Greenwood avenue, La Grande, Oregon; Dear Sir: The fake western railway Journal is either in La Grande or headed for your city. Warn our advertisers of their presence through the daily papers. Also advise local Chamber of Commerce, or the Merchant's Association. Have planned to be your way in June. E. J. ELBURY."

Mr. Elbury was in this city last fall, when he published the seniority railroad books for the trainmen. He claims to have a copyright on these books, and hence is sending out this warning to the local men against the representative who, he claims, are about to enter La Grande, and are fakes.

GOLDEN RULE HOTEL AT PENDLETON IS SOLD FOR \$30,000.00

PENDLETON, Mar. 11.—The Golden Rule hotel, one of the oldest buildings in the city, has been purchased by A. N. Packard of this city, from T. K. Beard of Mother, Ore., for \$30,000.

Mr. Packard, who has been proprietor of the hotel for the past two years since coming to Pendleton from Seattle, said that the hotel will be improved and renovated.

The building was built 30 years ago by John Gagen, the first owner and proprietor of the Golden Rule.

WORKERS OPPOSE A CUT IN WAGES

OMAHA, Mar. 11.—The packing house workers in conference have decided asking an injunction against the reduction of wages or the readjustment of working hours, if the appeal Wednesday night to President Harding fails, said Redmond S. Brennan, attorney for the workers.

PRESIDENT HAS NAMED DOCTOR

WASHINGTON, Mar. 11.—President Harding has appointed Dr. C. E. Sawyer, of Marion, O., the Harding family physician, his personal physician, and nominated him for the rank of brigadier general in the army medical corps. Dr. Sawyer's commission would follow a custom of years, under which the president's physician has been an officer of the army or navy medical service.

Dr. Sawyer will also investigate public health matters for the president.

State News

Albany's city jail has been condemned as unfit to house prisoners. Bounties for 12 bobcats and four coyotes were paid in Linn county last week.

The city of Sheridan has completed the sale of \$11,000 of street paving bonds.

Several cases of smallpox and scarlet fever are under quarantine at La Grande.

Smallpox has made its appearance again in Independence. Two homes are quarantined.

Albany's third annual automobile show was held Friday and Saturday at the armory.

Oregon City is industrially prosperous, the payrolls now aggregating close to \$50,000 a month.

Albany's Shrine club has been reorganized with a membership of 39. E. D. Cusick is president.

Perry Titus, aged 80, resident of Clatsop county for 46 years, is dead at his home in Astoria.

During the month of January, 23 arrests were made in Roseburg and fines amounting to \$128 were collected.

James Stephens, 60 years old, an old resident of Grant county, was found dead in his bed near Mount Vernon.

The egg market in Salem Friday reached its lowest point in seven years. Eggs sold at 25 cents a dozen retail.

William B. Tucker, at present county agent of Ada county, Idaho, has been appointed county agent for Crook county.

The body of Michael Hoff, pioneer business man of Baker, was found in his woods, where he had hanged himself.

Fire losses in Portland in 1926 totaled \$1,048,742, according to the annual report of Edward Grenfell, fire marshal.

The membership drive recently inaugurated by the Eugene Country club has resulted in 45 new names being obtained.

The overhead bridge across the Coyote cut-off east of Boardman on the Columbia highway has been thrown open for traffic.

Nels Nelson, mayor of Carlton and a long time resident of that district, died at McMinnville hospital, following an operation.

E. W. McMinden of the State Agricultural college extension department has been appointed agricultural agent for Clatsop county.

Owing to an epidemic of smallpox, measles, influenza and other diseases, the public schools at Yoncalla have been ordered closed.

A short course for Commercial club secretaries of Oregon will be held at the University of Oregon for one week, beginning March 28.

With but 56 families in the parish, Catholics of Roy, in Washington county, are erecting a church edifice at an expenditure of \$35,000.

The night train service on the Coos Bay line will not be resumed until weather conditions obviate the danger of trees falling across the track.

Mrs. Martha J. P. Quick, Oregon pioneer, is dead at Halsey, aged 86. Mrs. Quick came to Oregon in 1847 and had lived in Linn county since 1859.

Worthless checks issued in Bond during the past six months cost business men an average of \$100 a month, District Attorney A. J. Moore stated.

The Corvallis water commission is starting proceedings for an election to authorize a bond issue of \$100,000 with which to build a new 12-inch pipe line.

Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Woodard have just returned to Cottage Grove from a transcontinental motor trip of 19,000 miles, which consumed 19 months and 26 days.

The supreme court has upheld Corporation Commissioner Handley in a suit by a Texas oil syndicate, to force him to issue it a permit to sell stock in Oregon.

F. F. Fisher, on the banks of the Clackamas near Oregon City, claims that his flock of 180 hens in January produced 3228 eggs, and for the year 55,532 eggs.

Hugh Boyle, a citizen of Scotland, and Pedro Hernandez, a Mexican, in jail at Eugene, are in line for deportation. Both are charged with robbery and vagrancy.

Following investigations by a squad of detectives, one of whom was a woman, Wasco county officers have made a round-up of alleged prohibition law violators.

January was a hard month on bobcats in Lane county. Seventeen men and one woman collected bounties on 23 bobcat pelts, three mountain lions, two coyotes and one wolf.

Alvin C. L. Chante, wanted on a charge of embezzlement of funds of the Ontario branch of the Boise Payette Lumber company, was arrested at Long Beach, Cal., according to word received by Sheriff Noe of Malheur county.
